APRIL 2019 Public Session

A resident came to the meeting, as he had been nominated to join the Council and wanted to meet the Cllrs and learn more about current issues.

Councillors wished to record in the minutes their sadness at the recent loss, of two past Parish Cllrs Tyrone Baker and Mark Davies. Thoughts were with their family and friends at this time.

Cllr Matthan thanked Cllrs and staff for their support, during her term as District Councillor. She was not seeking re-election but had thoroughly enjoyed the last 4 years. Councillors wished her well for the future and thanked her for her commitment and help.

Neighbourhood Plan Update

The Plan group had met and agreed that the balance of funds could be used towards provision of facilities identified by the plan. NKDC Communities Dept had confirmed that this would be in order. District Cllr Matthan wished to acknowledge the huge efforts by everyone involved with the plan and offer thanks for a great achievement for the village.

Councillors discussed this application at length and have put forward the following comments:

- It was thought that there are too many houses for the plot size
- Billinghay Neighbourhood Plan is now adopted – how have the developers proposed to adhere to this?
- Cutting edge technology, reduction of fuel poverty and enhancing the environment and wildlife.
- Concerns that the properties will be too near the busy garage/ workshopnoise/ fumes issues etc.
- Billinghay would not want to lose the neighbouring well established business.
- Anglian water- flood and sewerage considerations. Adequate foul water disposal already exists or can be provided in time to serve the development.
- Entrance is on to a busy main road with 60 mph speed limit. What traffic calming measures are proposed?
- Concerns about one access road serving the properties.

It was mentioned that King Street and High Street would be resurfaced in the summer.

Correspondence

The majority of the correspondence had already been circulated but the following items had arisen:

- A letter had been received from ex Councillor Greetham thanking the Council for allowing him to serve the village. The Clerk was asked to write to him thanking him for his efforts.
- Councillors were reminded that there was a LALC training Day on the 4 July.

Finance

- (a) Payments & Receipts for Information a list of financial transaction for April was circulated prior to meeting and these were approved.
- (b) To accept Accounts and complete the Annual Return for the year ending 31 March 2019

 The documents were discussed at length and the answers on the Annual Return inserted as required. It was agreed unanimously that these be accepted

Burial Ground & Allotment Business Redesign of the Cemetery was mentioned as a consideration to ensure that the available space was used as well as possible.

Councillors Reports

The undernoted items were raised:

 The proliferation of advertising signs was mentioned, and the Chair agreed to obtain a draft advertising policy for consideration.

- Although the Council's Policies had been recently overhauled, it was agreed that a review on a regular basis was necessary.
- It was suggested that the areas in the Market Place at the base of the trees be cleaned up and gravel placed to prevent the growth of weeds.
- Council were asked to consider the appointment of an Enforcement Officer to help control dog fouling. The Clerk was asked to add this to the agenda for the next meeting.
- Training for residents to use a speed gun as in other villages was suggested.
- The Speed Indicator Device has been returned to the Village and will be brought back into use.
- The latest development off Mill Lane will be named Baker Street.
- The provision of Broadband at the Village Hall is under consideration.
- Work on the Community Garden will start on Saturday 18 May when a voluntary group from the British

- Legion will start clearing the site. The Billinghay Community Group were meeting to progress the plans already made.
- The replacement of the path in the Church Yard was discussed and the Clerk advised that a quote for the work was still awaited. Possible contractors to obtain alternate quotes were mentioned.
- The Community Infrastructure levy was discussed, and Councillors asked whether such money will come to the Parish Council. At the moment such monies are being directed to the Lincoln By-pass Scheme.
- It was agreed the Council assets should have identification marks for reference in the Assets Register.
 Reference was made to Litter and Dog Bins and this would be considered when the Risk Assessment is received.

When watching television or reading newspapers, I cannot help feeling guilty for what we are doing to the planet and how our generation get the blame for most of it. I, therefore, feel it necessary to print this apology that I have received from a fellow Senior Citizen:

HOW THE "GREY BEARDS" HAVE DESTROYED THE PLANET...A Seniors' "Lament" Checking out at the supermarket, the young cashier suggested to the much older woman that she should bring her own grocery bags because plastic bags weren't good for the environment. The woman apologized and explained, "We didn't have this 'green thing back in my earlier days."

The young cashier responded, "That's our problem today – your generation did not care enough to save our environment for future generations."

We refilled writing pens with ink instead of buying a new pen, and we replaced the razor blades in a razor instead of throwing away the whole razor just because the blade got dull.

But we didn't have the "green thing" back then.

Back then, people took the bus and kids rode their bikes to school or walked instead of turning their Mums into a 24-hour taxi service in the family's £50,000 People Carrier which cost the same as a whole house did before the "green thing." We had one electrical outlet in a room, not an entire bank of sockets to power a dozen appliances and we didn't need a computerized gadget to receive a signal beamed from satellites 23,000 miles out in space in order to find the nearest pub!

But isn't it sad that the current generation laments how wasteful we old folks were just because we didn't have the "green thing" back then?

Please forward this on to another selfish old person who needs a lesson in conservation. We have received another "VIEW FROM SKIRTH ROAD" and this is detailed below: It is often reported that when asked why he wanted to climb Mount Everest George Mallory said "because it is there". So he wanted to do achieve something and did not really care if he could not satisfy everybody with a reason but wanted to challenge himself. Diane wanted toffee so I decided I would have toffee as well for a change and sped off at the interval for two toffees and a vanilla. After finishing my ice cream I took my shot and the tub teetered on the edge of the bin before falling outside. I let out a cry of anguish and went to put it in the bin. The group in the row in front of me laughed and said "Hard luck". I had actually been given rum and raisin by mistake but being of a shy and retiring nature and not wanting to make a fuss or draw attention to myself I decided not to exchange it and ate my rum and raisin without complaint.

Diane passed me her tub and this time it was a really poor attempt. I did not have a chance to get up to put this in the bin as a loud authoritative cry of "ALLOW ME SIR" pierced the air and a member of the theatre staff marched brusquely past and picked up my tub, placed it in the bin, folded her arms and stood watching the audience in a fearsome manner. I did not know this lady's name but thought that I would make one up for her. I considered Victoria when Avril remarked "she is not amused" but decided on Helga after Helga Geerhart, the female Gestapo agent of the BBC situation comedy Allo Allo. To the mirth of my party and the group in front Helga pounced on members of the audience as they finished their ice creams and took their tubs of them and put them into the bin, clearly determined to ensure that my frivolity did not become contagious. I decided to offer her a chocolate and waved the box in the air but she avoided looking at me. She did not need to do so as she had extraordinary peripheral vision. Avril finished her ice cream and passed her tub to me. The exact instant it arrived in my hand Helga spun round and picked up the bin and sped over to me. "DO YOU REQUIRE A BIN SIR?". The fact that I have been able to write this is proof that I have arrived back safe and sound. I have already set myself a new challenge. I will go to the next production (the Ghost train at the beginning of July) and see if I can persuade Helga to eat one of my chocolates and smile at me

A credit score tells a potential lender how likely you are to repay the debt. It is based on your track record. As a result, if you have never had credit you cannot demonstrate how likely you are to repay it.

For those who have had money problems in the past and have struggled with repayments they may find their credit score reduces the chances of taking out a loan, credit card or even a mobile phone contract. It may even mean the only credit available to them is at an extremely high interest rate (the lenders way of hedging their bets that you don't pay it back.)

More than half of UK adults don't know their credit score. It is now a free service and there are number of different ways to access your score; Experian, Equifax and Noddle to name a few.

So, if your score is below average or you are unable to get credit how can it be improved:

- Register to vote (this shows you have roots at your address)
- Pay your bills on time (direct debits make this easier)
- Make sure bills have your name on
- Have bank account registered at your address
- Consider taking out a credit card but pay your balance off in full each month (you won't pay any interest and you are proving that you are creditworthy)
- Take care when applying for credit, if you keep getting declined this will reduce your chances even further
- Make sure the details on your credit record are correct

Land at The former Lafford School Billinghay Parish Council



As mentioned in earlier issues of the Newsletter, Lincolnshire County Council have contacted Billinghay Parish Council with an offer to the Parish to lease land at the Lafford School site behind the area for the proposed houses fronting on to Fen Road.

This offer was part of the conditions for acceptance of the Planning Application for the housing development. There is no option to buy and the Parish need not lease all the land (3.8 acres).

Conditions applying in the lease would include:

- No erection of permanent buildings
- If land was required for expansion of the school, this would be taken albeit with reasonable notice
- The charge for leasing the whole area would start at £970 per annum (Not negotiable) and be reviewed on a regular basis.

The Parish Council have been asked to respond to the offer as soon as possible, with details of proposed usage should they wish to take up the lease.

Ideas are needed as to possible use and, at present, suggestions put forward include:

- The erection of a Community Building for use as a Scout Hut (although also available for other organisations). The building would have to be of a temporary nature.
- Another possible use would be for garden allotments. We have a list of people who expressed an interest in acquiring such an allotment but this was compiled some years ago. If you are interested in having a garden allotment, let us know.

If you would like to get involved with this project, have other ideas for the possible use of this area or have any relevant comments, the Parish Council would like to hear from you.


