## COUNCIL REPORT

#### Hello from Billinghay Parish Council

Since the last issue of the *Billinghay Times* a lot has been happening in the village:

Three new councillors have been co-opted onto the Parish Council and we welcome Jim Jackson, Alice Walters and Frankie Harvey to the team.

The Environment Enforcement Officer has been making his patrols educating residents on littering, dog walking and dog fouling issues, anti-social behaviour, fly-tipping and fly posting. Feedback has been excellent and everyone will have noticed the improved appearance of the village, especially around the area of the Old Bridge, and Walcott Road opposite the entrance to Mill Lane with the absences of fly-posting. BPC are always happy to display notices for community events on the noticeboards, as space allows. Please be aware however, that the council does have an advertising policy and any fly posting will be removed if relevant permissions are not sought.

The Community Speed Watch Scheme is gathering speed. Nine volunteers have completed the first stage of their initial training, locations for carrying out the speed checks have been identified and agreed with the Lincolnshire Road Safety Partnership, and a date for the road side training will soon be known. If you would like to volunteer to help keep our roads safe please contact the Parish Office.

Work has commenced to update the Emergency Plan for the village, so please contact the office if you can help in any way in the event of an emergency. This includes: meeting and greeting, serving refreshments, knocking on doors to alert neighbours to the emergency, providing four wheeled drive vehicles, giving first aid, completing paperwork, etc. If you can help in any way, please contact the Parish Office. Or if you fancy being the next Flood Warden, please get in touch.

Lincolnshire County Council has given the go ahead for a non- permanent community building to be erected on part of the playing field at the former Lafford School site. It is thought that this building could become a much needed Scout Hut but also be available to all the village youth and community groups. There is much to research and investigative work to be undertaken before this can become a reality and a steering group is being set up to develop a business plan. The Christmas tree lighting ceremony take place on Wednesday 4 December, with a blessing and carols and festive songs around the tree commencing at 6.30pm with free refreshments served afterwards in the Community Rooms. A few stalls are available for local businesses and groups to use at no cost (first come first served.) **Please note: This event goes ahead no matter what the weather!** 

Please look out for posters on the noticeboards and Facebook nearer the date.

With over 20 groups and clubs in the village, from Beavers to Night Owls Book Club, from Bowls to Youth Club, from Brownies to Keep Fit, there is something to do for all ages and all interests. Details of all are listed in this newsletter.

Other activities and events are brought to us by village venues and community groups, such as quizzes and karaoke at The Ship Inn, panto and other performances by Billinghay Amateur Dramatics Association (BADASS), and award winning rural touring theatre productions at subsidized prices organised by Billinghay Community Group.

If you want to find out what's on in the village, or wish to promote your event for free, don't forget to join the Billinghay Diary Facebook page, set up by a former chair of the Parish Council, to ensure events don't clash and to make it easy to see what's happening in the area without having to scroll through adverts or general posts.

## STREET LIGHTING IN BILLINGHAY



Please note that Lincolnshire County Council are having certain lighting columns on the A153 (North Kyme Drove & Tattershall Road) removed in the near future. These lights have been turned off since November 2016. The decision to remove them has been taken after consultation with the Lincolnshire Road Safety Partnership after an analysis of accident data since then. This will save money as there will not be a need for periodic condition inspections.

In addition, we would advise that, as in previous years, the timing of part-night street lights switching off will have been affected by clocks going back at the end of October . This is not a technical fault that needs reporting. The lights have sensors which monitor the number of daylight hours upon which the integrated timer works. During the autumn, the lights enter a period of adjustment when the timings may vary as they adapt to the switch to GMT. Unfortunately this is unavoidable but should have no impact on safety.





### **BILLINGHAY CHURCH OF ENGLAND PRIMARY SCHOOL**

At the time of writing we have just started another school year and already our thoughts are turning towards Christmas and the different productions and events.

Our pupils have just taken part in a non curriculum week in school entitled Lincolnshire Week. Miss Hall organised for a shire horse and tractor to visit school and we also had a great day on the 9<sup>th</sup> with the Red Arrows Ambassadors coming into school to talk to all our pupils. Many now wish to be pilots in the RAF! Her Hawk Class also visited the Lincolnshire Showground on the 8<sup>th</sup> to take part in a range of fun interactive sessions (alongside other primary aged pupils) celebrating all that is great about Lincolnshire. To conclude the week we invited parents / carers into school so our pupils could showcase all the work completed and also giving the opportunity for our parents / carers to taste the Lincolnshire produce made by each class.

Miss Hall has also organised a careers fayre for our pupils on the 15<sup>th</sup> October whereby volunteers are coming into school to talk to our pupils about different job opportunities that are available for the future, with the hope of inspiring them to set goals and realise that anything is possible.

Results from our Year 6 cohort in the 2018-19 academic year continue to be extremely positive. The progress scores made by our Year 6 pupils (measured from Year 2 to Year 6) continues to be significantly above the national average and places the school in the top 25% of schools nationally in reading and writing and well within the top 40% of schools nationally in maths.

Our Harvest Festival Service took part at St Michael's Church on the 10<sup>th</sup> October. Many thanks to all who attended and also to those people who donated food items. All donations of harvest produce are going to the Sleaford Community Larder.

We yet again achieved the School Games Mark Gold Award last year and have already made a strong start to the year in terms of achieving the award for 2019-20. Many of the activities, clubs etc. in school are geared towards meeting the DfE Guidance recommending all children and young people aged 5 – 18 engage in in at least 60 minutes of physical activity a day, of which 30 minutes should be in school. We are also aiming to promote healthy lifestyles and develop skills of cooking and dance. Currently school offers a variety of sports clubs at lunch time and after school, including Dance, Football, Frisbee, Basketball and Tchoukball. All are free as school uses some of the Sports Premium to pay for them. Children from school have taken part in the following competitions so far this term: Girls Football, Tchoukball and Volleyball. We also have some Year 5/6 pupils as playground leaders who organise lunchtime physical activities twice a week.

The admissions process for pupils into Reception from September 2020 opens on the 14<sup>th</sup> November 2019 and closes on the 15<sup>th</sup> January 2020. School are hosting an open afternoon from 2.00pm on the 14<sup>th</sup> November whereby all prospective parents of Reception pupils due to start school in September 2020 are extremely welcome to come and view our school and talk to our fantastic staff. If this date is not convenient then please contact school and we can arrange an alternate date.

Next term we are looking forward to yet again having a joint service at the Methodist Chapel for our Operation Christmas Child Shoe Box appeal on the 7<sup>th</sup> November at 10am.

I would like to thank everyone for their ongoing support and we look forward to building on our successes this school year.

#### LINCOLNSHIRE POLICE NEWS October 2019

#### Dear Billinghay Residents.

With the end of the British Summertime and the clocks changing please follow the advice below to make your home less attractive to the opportunist criminal. A common aspect of why a particular property in a street is targeted has been when the owner has left the property in darkness which makes it very obviously unoccupied.

- Use a timer switch to ensure lights and/or radio comes on when it becomes dark.
- Don't leave windows open, they create an easy access point.
- Cancel deliveries of milk and papers if going away.
- Don't leave spare keys outside, burglars know all the hiding places and where to look.

As the crops in the fields have been harvested, Lincolnshire Police start to receive an increased number of reports of illegal hare coursing in the county. Officers will be gearing up with their annual Operation Galileo - a tried and tested approach which aims to tackle incidents of hare coursing and puts out a warning to illegal hare coursers to keep out of Lincolnshire. Police evidence shows hare coursers bring other forms of criminal activity and usually come from outside the county, causing damage to the land and alarm to local communities.

Lincolnshire Police have received a number of reports in the North Kesteven area where people have been scammed.

Scams come in many forms; uninvited contact is received by email, letter, and telephone or in person making false promises to con victims out of money. There are many of these sorts of scams but some of the most common are fake lotteries, deceptive prize draws, clairvoyants, computer scams, and romance scams.

The criminals attempt to trick people with flashy, official looking documents or websites, or convincing telephone sales patter, with the aim of persuading them to send a processing or administration fee, pay postal or insurance costs.

One of the most common methods in this area is for a fraudster to pose as your bank or the Police to assist in a Police investigation over the phone. They claim your bank account has been fraudulently accessed, and that in order to protect your account you must act quickly. They say the solution is for you to transfer your money to a so-called 'safe account'. But actually, this account is controlled by the fraudster. When you move the money, they steal it.

Some instances they suggest that you hang up and ring the Police/Bank back to ensure the call is genuine. – Don't be fooled – they stay on the line! Some occasions they ask you to attend your bank/ post office and withdraw your money, even in euros or send cash through MoneyGram's.

Fraudsters often use a tactic called 'number spoofing', in order to make their call appear genuine. The number you see on your phone display matches that of your bank or local

number. But in fact the fraudster has manipulated this number, by disabling the actual number they are calling from. Should you query who they are and if they are genuine, they ask you to check your handset display in an attempt to convince you it's a real call.

The fraudster, often claiming to come from some well-known computer company, will try to convince you that your computer has a virus, or that your internet connection is running slow. To 'fix' the problem the fraudster will ask you to allow them to take control of your computer in order to work on it. Once on your computer, they install software which steals your personal data. Also, if the fraudster asks you to access your online bank account for payment, they can see you enter all your login details.

Remember Police and banks will never ask you to withdraw money and send it to them. Don't discuss money on the phone!

# **BYGONES**

The recent appalling weather and rainfall along with the creation of a New Emergency Plan for the village has prompted us to look back on previous flooding "emergencies", details of which are given below:

In **1877**, there was disastrous flood when an embankment gave way and inundated 3000 acres of fenland to the depth of 8 feet. 300 people were made temporarily homeless and damage was estimated at £2000 (a vast sum in those days). To start the repair, three barges were sunk across the gap thus giving some idea of the size of the breach.

The damage and the effect on the local population caused the following appeal to be published in the local press:

The Revd. E. Jenkins, Vicar of Billinghay, appeals for help on behalf of his unfortunate parishioners who are suffering from the present calamitous floods. In consequence of an important embankment giving way upwards of 3,000 acres of fenland in a high state of cultivation are under water, in some places to the depth of eight feet. Three hundred people including women and children are thus deprived of their homes and must be so for a long time to come.

Their last year's crops are in many cases completely destroyed and the autumn sown wheat it is feared will perish. Several of their homes are undermined and giving way. These unfortunate sufferers are thus deprived of their means of existence and are reduced to a state of distress far exceeding anything known in the memory of the oldest inhabitants.

In January 1939 very close to the site of the 1877 disaster, local people discovered a bank in imminent danger of collapse. Men worked day and night for two and a half days to strengthen the flood defences to prevent a recurrence of the earlier disaster.

In more modern times, there is still an ever present danger of floods. As recently as 1960 and 1977 there were incidents as can be seen from the picture overleaf.

There were also problems in 1981, as can be seen from the extract below that appeared in the Sleaford Standard:

Billinghay was one of the worst hit villages in the area when heavy rains resulted in flooding. Four inches of rain fell in Lincolnshire between Friday and Sunday creating the most serious floods since 1947.

Obviously, the reporter was not aware of the problems in Billinghay in 1960 and 1977!







The first letter below has come from one of the village businesses who used to advertise in the Newsletter.

We are sure that those residents who availed themselves of Lee's services in the past would like to thank him for his expertise when dealing with their problems.

Needless to say we have received our usual contribution from our Skirth Road resident who has chosen to write about babies (possibly based on observation rather than experience). You may find the article long but it is accompanied by a poem (by Peta Pinder) and a photograph of our contributor "holding the Baby".

May 6th 2019 was an easy day for newspaper editors and TV news controllers everywhere. No difficult decisions on how to fill up the pages or what the main headline would be. It would have made no difference if Donald Trump had obliterated the Korean peninsula with a nuclear weapon or if all of the world's ice had melted overnight. A royal baby had been born and nothing could compete with that. The birth of a royal baby means "all hands to the pump". When the birth is imminent, and the mother is taken into hospital a myriad of reporters and journalists are sent hotfoot to stand at the entrance to the hospital and all scheduled programmes (apart from soap operas) are taken off the air so that there can be a programme from the news studio involving frequent live visits to the hospital entrance to get the latest update of who has arrived, who has not arrived and who has left. When the baby is born attention shifts to the naming of the baby with a stream of royal afficionados appearing behind the microphones to offer their opinions on how many names the baby will have and what they will be. You have to be careful with the naming of a baby especially when it comes to registering the birth. I recall being told a few years ago of a gentleman saying to the registrar " Anne (with an e) Jones" and then being given a birth certificate with the name "Ann Withany Jones".

Fascination with babies is not confined to royal babies. Many villages have at least one coffee morning each week and nothing really causes as much excitement as a new entrant to the world that has some connection with the locality. New parents are of course thrilled to have their new arrival and because of the time that they will spend doting on and bonding with their new baby and carrying out the time-consuming task of parenting in early weeks they will not have the time to issue reports to the world detailing a contraction by contraction account of the birth and place a thousand photographs on Facebook or store them in their mobile phones Such restrictions of course do not apply to grandparents or

great aunts who will quite likely be retired and have plenty of time on their hands.

Coffee mornings following a new arrival tend to follow a familiar pattern. The new Grandparent (in my experience usually grandmother) arrives to be congratulated by the assembled throng. This act of congratulation has always seemed to me to be slightly strange and belated as grandmother's contribution to the process had taken place many years before, sometimes in excess of 40.

While waiting for her cup of coffee to arrive grandmother will make sure that the group have all of the important details regarding the birth including how difficult the labour was, the date and exact time of the birth and the exact weight of the baby. When there is a pause someone is bound to ask if she has any photographs. This is of course a welcome question to grandmother who is bursting to show everybody the contents of her mobile phone but does not want to seem pushy and without the question may have to contain herself for a minute and a half. Coffee drinkers able to see the phone give it their full attention and likenesses to relatives are investigated. "oh hasn't he got his father's chin?". I find myself wondering what would have happened if dad had not had a double chin and am pleased for the young chap that his dad had one to spare. Other parts of the face are assigned to other family members and it is easy to forget that this little chap is actually a living individual in his own right and not a complicated jigsaw puzzle that has been formed by people sitting at a table cutting up photographs of his relatives and piecing them together to get the desired result. The phone is then passed round, and all can see for themselves the twenty eight photographs taken of the new baby in a 30 minute period as he lay sleeping in his cot. I usually satisfy myself with looking at one and commenting "very nice" and passing it on. Here is an example of how a phrase can mean different things in different contexts. If someone has cooked a meal and been told that it is "very nice" they usually take it as a compliment but that is not the case with babies. When looking at a photograph of a baby it would seem to be very advisable to utter one of the words "beautiful" or "gorgeous" and preferably both. By the time that the phone has completed its circuit there will have been a thorough analysis of the full name of the baby as the grandmother is questioned on the family history as people want to know who he or she has been named after. Sometimes parents choose a name for their youngster simply because they like the name but that is a concept not understood by some members of the coffee group who ask why the baby has been given a particular name when there is no family ancestry to support the choice.

One week a real live baby called Tommy appeared and I was told that he looked like me!!. I hastily commented that if he did it was pure coincidence. Having done almost a lap of the table Tommy arrived in in the arms of Peta who was seated next to me. Having held him for a short while she asked me if I wanted a cuddle. My initial thought was that that would not be easy while she was holding a baby but it was made clear to me that I was guilty of a misunderstanding when Peta passed me little Tommy who gave a yawn and a stretch and settled down for a relaxing 20 minutes, quite probably very relieved that his involuntary stint in the latest rehearsal of the Darby and Joan Christmas Pass the Parcel had come to an end. As I might have guessed this would not be allowed to pass without a photograph and clamour for publication in the newsletter!!! I must admit that I did not realise at the time that I would be honoured in a Peta Pinder poem.

So as will have become apparent the birth of a new baby gives joy and pleasure to people beyond the immediate family and is also welcome to correspondents of bimonthly village newsletters who may be running out of ideas for their columns. I wonder if our queen has experienced a similar thought because after a long reign it cannot be easy to keep finding original material for her 3pm Christmas Day message. To please the majority of the viewers this year Her Majesty will only need to say hello at the beginning and wish everyone a merry Christmas in conclusion whilst the intervening period is filled in with a slide show of the first six months of the life of Archie Harrison Mountbatten-Windsor.

Merry Christmas Archie and Merry Christmas to babies everywhere. You are all doing a great job without even knowing it.

This week I read a very interesting on article on an American couple who paid off \$100,000 of debt in less than 3 years.

The debt had been built up as students and they had decided that they didn't want it to be a lifetime burden. The first crucial step was to make the decision and come up with a plan.

The biggest impact on the success was cutting back on wasteful spending. To do this they were fully engaged with the end goal and I'm sure it wasn't easy. They stopped buying unnecessary groceries, the 'maybe I'll need it one day' outfits and eating out.

As well as his usual salaried job he did some overtime and used every penny to pay off the debt. When they received pay rises it was used to pay off debts.

They did however take an unusual step, in paying off the smallest debt first. Of course, they continued to make the minimum repayments on all their debts but focused their overpayments on the smallest debt.

As a Financial Planner my advice would be to pay off the debt with the highest rate of interest first however I can see where they were coming from. By paying off the smallest debt first they had a sense of achievement which gave them drive to pay off the next debt. They called this the 'snowball effect'.

By having a 'debt friend' they used each other to stay on track. Any signs of slipping and the partner would remind them of the longer term goal.

I am sure the couple sat down and worked out what their essential spending was, what they earned and how much they could realistically use for debt repayment each month. There are some useful calculators online to help calculate how quickly debt can be paid off. Finally I would imagine that they wrote down their goals (maybe even posted it on the fridge as a daily reminder) and made a commitment to each other .

This is proof that short term pain can lead to long term gain. If this applies to you then I wish you the best of luck, it'll be worth it.


