COUNCIL MEETING REPORTS

FEBRUARY 2019

Public Session

No members of public attended.

Clerk's Update

Most items had been circulated before the meeting, but the following matters were discussed:

Details were given regarding training for prospective Parish & District Councillors.

The Clerk agreed to deliver all applications received by her for the forthcoming Parish Council Election.

There is a workshop for Arts Projects in the Village Hall on 15 February (10.00 to 16.00) and attendance is open to everyone.

The Clerk had met with a representative of Lincolnshire County Council regarding the offer to the Parish to lease land at the Lafford School site behind the area for the proposed houses fronting on to Fen Road. This offer was part of the conditions for acceptance of the Planning Application. There is no option to buy but the Parish need not lease all the land (3.8 acres). Conditions applying in the lease would include:

- No erection of permanent buildings
- If land was required for expansion of the school, this would be taken albeit with reasonable notice
- The charge for leasing the whole area would start at £970 per annum (Not negotiable) and be reviewed on a regular basis.

The Clerk has been asked to respond to the

offer as soon as possible with details of proposed usage should the Council take up the lease. Ideas are needed as to possible use and, at present, ones put forward include the erection of a Community Building for use as a Scout Hut although available for other Organisations. This would have to comply with 1 above. Another idea is to create Garden Allotments.

It was agreed use the Newsletter and Facebook to request residents to put forward ideas. Councillors were also asked to put forward their ideas as soon as possible. Apparently, the Co-op no longer offer photocopying facilities and it was agreed to offer this service at the Parish Office (the charge per sheet would be 10p for mono and 20p for colour)

Neighbourhood Plan Update

The plan goes to referendum on the 7 March with polling taking place at the Village Hall (7.00 to 22.00). NKDC are responsible for arranging and paying for the poll and residents eligible to vote should receive their polling cards soon. Copies of the final plan will be available for viewing in locations around the village. Details of the referendum will be given in the Newsletter and on Facebook.

Plans for Annual Parish Meeting

The date for the Annual Parish Meeting (not a Council Meeting) is the 20 May. It was agreed to invite all local Businesses. Clubs and Groups to attend and have a stall so they can impart information about their Organisation. Councillors have been requested to attend to discuss relevant local matters with the residents.

There will be an opportunity for residents to express their views on the usage of the Lafford School site for which a lease has been offered.

The village PCSO will also be invited to attend.

Highways and Police Matters

The long-standing problem with the manhole cover in Walcott Road has been fixed. Councillors were not happy with the work done along the High street and Walcott Road by the Road Contractors last year. They asked the Clerk to inform LCC Highways that there is a lot of loose grit on the road and footpaths.

The Speed Indicator Device has now been returned from Martin/Timberland and it was agreed that this be deployed along Mill Lane.

Finance

It was agreed unanimously to accept the accounts for the quarter ending 31 December 2018. These had been circulated prior to the meeting.

Burial Ground and Allotment Business

The Clerk is now acting on the problem headstones identified in the report prepared by the Councillors.

Councillors Reports

The following issues were raised:

- There is still a problem with the manhole cover outside 83 High Street
- One of the street lights in Ringmoor Close needs attention (already reported)
- The provision of a light on Ringmoor
 House to illuminate the area down to the
 High Street was requested. The Clerk will
 discuss with NKDC.
- A question regarding the privacy of residents in Ringmoor House relating to the effect of the Community Garden project was raised. The Councillor was assured that the plans included the fencing off their outside patio areas.
- Issues with dog fouling were raised and it was suggested that the dog warden be used to deter the offending owners. The Clerk will contact him.
- The Clerk advised that two new dog bins were being installed by a local handyman

- who was also going to renovate the Parish Noticeboards.
- The poor state of some of the litter and dog bins was mentioned and it was agreed that any action required would be based on the Risk Assessment that is due to take place.
- The Clerk mentioned that she is discussing the possibility of one large Black bin at the cemetery as visitors do not seem to be able to place the rubbish in the correct bins currently in use.

MARCH 2019

As the County Councillor had to attend another meeting later in the evening it was agreed that he could address the meeting first. He advised that:

- The question of illegal signage that had been referred to him was really a matter for NKDC to enforce and he suggested that the Office contact the Enforcement Officer at the District Council.
- The reported grass verge damage between the Convenience Store and Shire Close had been marked for "no further action" by Highways. He agreed to check if anything further could be done.
- Highways had been checking plans for 2019 and surface dressing for the following areas was included – Field Road, Meadow Way, the Causeway.
- The drain cover at Walcott Road has been fixed.
- He reported that LCC Highways were changing their process for Traffic Regulation Orders and intended to get more input from local residents and councils.
- Improvements were planned for the A153 junction with the A17 (work to commence April 2020 estimated 3 months) and the Holdingham Roundabout on the A17 (work to commence after the above was completed).

Public Session

Two residents attended the meeting to ask questions and make observations about the Neighbourhood Plan with the referendum date being close.

Concern was expressed about the impact of the planned housing on:

- The poor state of the current roads and the impact of more traffic
- How would the school cope with the increased number of children?
- The ability of the Medical Centre to cope with an expanded population
- Lack of transport links

There was considerable discussion of how the Plan related to these aspects and what the adoption of the plan would give to the village if NKDC had to take its provisions into account when making their decisions. The relevance of the planning process involving each of Central Government, District and Parish was explained.

Clerk's Update

The Clerk left details of the items she wished to report, and these are detailed below:

- Two dog bins on the Skirth Bank and the Playing Field have been replaced
- Some waste bins and dog bins needed repair or replacement but as a risk assessment was to be carried out shortly on these items, it was agreed to await the outcome of this.
- Electoral nomination packs have been requested and will be distributed when received.
- High Street, Walcott Road and King Street are to be resurfaced this year.
- NCS want the village to host another project and Councillors agreed to support this.
- Details of the NKDC Electoral
 Briefing meetings were circulated

Planning Matters Applications

19/0237/House Twenty Foot Farm
Tattershall Bridge – installation of French

1867/OUT 38 High Street – erection of two dwellings – the following comments were

The Parish Council commented as follows:

- The plot seems too small for two three bedroomed semis
- Proximity to existing buildings and type of building proposed means that it is bound to be intrusive on privacy
- There does not appear to be suitable parking for two houses as the driveway would be blocked by just one car.
- There are already parking issues on the High Street that the drive opens onto. More cars would exacerbate the problems.
- Bin collection can be a problem in that area too as the footpath is often blocked by bins awaiting collection.
- Visibility from the access to the drive is very poor especially when large numbers of vehicles are parking there.

Approved

Anglian Pottery Church Street Apartments. **Neighbourhood Plan Update**

Date of referendum confirmed, and Councillors volunteered to attend.

Plans for Annual Parish Meeting It was agreed to:

- Send invites to Village Businesses and Organisations requesting their attendance and possibly having a stall
- Invite the PCSO
- Invite the different churches
- Obtain an estimate for a buffet for 20 people
- Obtain some display boards so information can be disseminated.

Finance

Internal Auditor

The Clerk reported that a suitable candidate for the position of Internal Auditor (Julie Stevenson) had been found and she is forwarding details of her usual contract etc. Her appointment was agreed unanimously.

Consider purchase of Parish Map

This was discussed but the Council did not feel that the expense was something they wanted to incur.

Burial Ground & Allotment Business

A problem related to removal of wreaths and floral tributes was discussed and it was agreed that residents could be compensated if the Clerk felt it was warranted.

Councillors Reports

The following were reported:

- There is a pothole outside Emma's Hairdressers
- A new sticker is required for the garden waste bin at the cemetery if we are to continue separating waste rather than acquire one large bin.
- Lafford land a plan for possible use of land as Scout Hut/Community Meeting place was produced.
- The streetlight at Ringmoor House was still not functioning
- Creative projects could put forward a funding bid in East Midlands
- Councillors were reminded of requirements for completing their Election packs when received.
- The "tip" near the Mill Lane Building site has been inspected by NKDC Environment people but nothing has been done as yet.
- District Councillors mentioned that the recent Cluster Group meeting was interested in bringing Gas into their areas.
- They also discussed Emergency Resilience Plans and recommended that the Council approach the County Emergency Planning Unit to update Billinghay plans.
- Electoral procedural changes were being introduced so that ID was required

Hello from the BCP team!

We would like to take this opportunity to say a huge thank you to all the residents who took the time to vote in person, by post, or by proxy at the referendum for Billinghay Neighbourhood Plan on 7 March 2019. Billinghay, yet again, had the opportunity to have its voice heard.

334 people voted, of which, 269 voted "yes" to the NKDC taking the neighbourhood plan into consideration when deciding planning applications, 63 voted "no" and 2 votes were spoilt.

This is a great result for Billinghay and is the outcome of much hard work, extensive public consultation, lots of researching, writing, more writing, and even more re-writing! And we could not have done any of this without YOU. So, thank you for answering surveys, for attending events and meetings, for sharing your thoughts and views, for providing evidence, for reading and commenting on the developing plan, for critiquing and proof-reading, and most importantly for voting.

As a committee there were times when we thought we would never reach the referendum stage, and the process has taken a couple of years longer than we ever anticipated. However, we have laughed and cried, developed new skills, made new friends, brought funding to the village, learned a whole new planning-speak vocabulary, and put Billinghay on the map – for all the right reasons. We listened and created the vision that Billinghay requested.

There is one final hoop to be jumped through – the Plan has yet to be formally adopted by NKDC, which should take place at the next full meeting of NKDC at the end of April 2019.

The last BCP meeting was held on 20 March to ensure the committee was closed down correctly and any loose ends tidied up. The Facebook page will stay open as a source of reference for new residents who may like to find out more about how the Plan was developed over the last few years, and also to help other communities as they undertake their own neighbourhood plans. The website is to be closed, and the email will direct residents and other interested parties to the Parish Council.

The remainder of the BCP funding is ring-fenced within the Parish Council budget and will be used towards projects identified within the Plan.

And then there will be the review of the Plan in about 2 years' time Wishing you all a warm and sunny spring!

We are always looking for volunteers specially to help us run our sessions so if you have a few hours each week to spare and feel you can help us with this then please contact us directly.







Our correspondent from Skirth Road has been splashing his cash on raffles as can be seen below:

It would seem that a social event or fundraising event is not complete without a raffle. People seem to love them. There is a real gambling culture in this locality and to be fair in most others as well. Any organisation can confidently organise a function at cost price knowing a healthy profit will be made when customers shell out for raffle tickets and happily donate prizes. Money handed over for a raffle somehow never seems the same as money that is paid as an admission fee. Very similar to paying by card. It never strains the tear ducts as much to stick a card in a machine as it does when forced to extract actual notes from a wallet.

"Are we going to the pictures tonight luv?"

"Nah let's go to the bowls club quiz. Its only a fiver and we can give 'em a bottle of whisky for the raffle".

If you go to functions in the locality you will see many prizes appearing again and again (and again) as they are re-donated to other raffles . "Recycling" as a good friend of mine calls it. It would be interesting (to some people) and revealing to give each prize its own passport to accompany it around the locality where each organisation stamps and dates its appearance as a raffle prize.

By far the biggest raffles seem to appear in January as it is the first opportunity to dispose of all of those unwanted Christmas presents. I recall a recent January raffle where I was depositing an individual tea-set composed of a tiny teapot, cup, milk jug and sugar bowl. All very nice but a right faff. OK for people living on their own who consider themselves too posh to put a teabag in a mug. I was joined by a trim looking elderly gentleman depositing the 48 inch waist shorts that he had been given by his sister.

Of course not all of unwelcome Christmas presents can be given to raffles. Those of a more permanent and ornamental nature have to be stored in the loft within easy reach and carefully labelled so that they can be hurriedly retrieved and put on display when the relevant donors pay a visit. It is especially difficult if they arrive unannounced

Many organisers cut down this time by having designated numbered prizes where the winners have no choice but to accept what they get. This is loved by organisers as more people will end up with prizes they don't want and will take them to future raffles. I remember walking round with a purple teddy bear during the interval of a music evening and being asked 5 or 6 times.

"have you won that in the raffle?". Why do they need to ask? Of course I had. It certainly shows how popular people think I am when they obviously think that there is a possibility that I have taken a teddy bear out with me for company.

A recent Countdown quiz night had what I thought to be an excellent rule that winners must take a prize. This does cut out the annoying "put it back" shout that wastes time and also shows disrespect to people who have donated prizes who are most probably in the room at the time. What some will see as an act of philanthropy will be interpreted by others as "everything left is rubbish" and I don't want any of it"

Better stop now before I do too much more moaning as I have to get ready for Scrabble Club and of course the mid evening raffle. Now where did I put that wobbly clown?

Thank you to all of those past and present for the continual support over the last seven years.



B.A.D. ASS TRIUMPH AGAIN

Our intrepid Theatre Correspondent has been taking in the local culture again and has sent us this report on the latest B.A.D.Ass production

Leaving the Ship Inn one Sunday evening in January after another fine quiz I saw a poster for the latest BADASS production, a pantomime titled Cinderella and The Pantomime Thief with performances on Saturday 23rd and Sunday 24th February at the bargain price of £4.50.

A couple of days later I arrived home to find a big wodge of fliers, which looked like a smaller version of the poster, stuffed into an old walking boot on the doorstep asking me to deliver along Skirth Road and Carr Gate. Delivering in this area is not really a chore as there will always be someone to stop for a natter or ask me if I want a cuppa. I remember one wintry afternoon when it took me 3 hours to deliver 12 copies of the Billinghay Times and Advertiser. After a couple of days I found time in my hectic schedule to deliver the fliers and having done a couple I decided to glance at one and noticed there was no date on them. After a couple of texts I returned home from a private café on Skirth Road to wait for another improved set of fliers to be delivered. Apparently a member of Badass did his round without noticing the omission. He seems to be an ideal candidate for a job at Royal Mail. Far better than a post woman of my past who would hand me a postcard accompanied by a report of the contents thus saving me the job of reading it myself.

Now BADASS usually have a raffle at pantomimes. It seems to me that this has two advantages. It raises extra money and also can be worked into the script as a way of lengthening the pantomime without having to think of extra lines to write. This year was to be different as the raffle was done in the interval.

I found some things that I thought might suffice as raffle prizes and set off to deliver them. Walking down a drive I heard a loud voice and arriving at the back door of a dwelling saw a lady talking loudly. I assumed she was on the phone with the speaker switched on but I was wrong. She was learning her lines. It looked as if this year's performance would be as good as ever. The first A in BADASS stands for amateur and this is undeniably factual in the sense that the performers do not get paid but not accurate in any other definition of amateur.

I opted for the Saturday afternoon performance as Lincoln City were playing away and being at the pantomime would be less stressful than listening to the radio. Three colours of raffle tickets were available and Caroline (who it was good to see again) told me that the tickets were £1 a strip or 6 strips for £5. I said that I would have two strips of each to be told that would be £4 but if I had 3 of each it would be £5. Fortunately as I was a mathematics teacher for many years I was able to both recognise the error and explain it.

I parked myself near the back of the packed audience and settled down to another very good production by BADASS. It contained all of the usual pantomime features one hopes for with plenty of sweets for children and birthday messages. On stage were the usual pantomime dames with multiple changes of costume with excellent performances as Frederique (Lee Davis) and Jeffrina (Steven Taylor). There was the requisite number of terrible corny jokes and it was pleasing to me that The Spirit of the Ring (Katie Harlow) catered for the adults in the audience with good memories with a corny joke about the long defunct Safeway supermarket. The cast was quite small and it was really good to see some juniors David Hood as Prince Charming and Alyss Casement as Cinderella give

very confident performances on stage, Alyss in particular revealing quite considerable singing talent.

After a good first half there was the compulsory interval for refreshment that gave the opportunity for the Village Hall to relieve me of more money. I asked for two cups of coffee and was given one good cup and one that was one third full. I asked for it to be filled up and in doing so the waiter dropped it and had to start again. I don't know if he was anticipating another hot summer and a water shortage but there was no more in the cup the second time around. However persistence paid off and I eventually came away with two cups of coffee. Then I noticed that there was ice cream so I took the coffees to my friend and then purchased the ice cream. Now came the difficulty. Do I ingest hot and cold together? Do I eat my ice cream before the coffee goes cold or drink my coffee before the ice cream melts. As I can scoff cold ice cream more quickly than I can drink hot coffee I had the ice cream first.

So back to the second half and more good appearances from Tobias Downes as Wiggle disguising himself as other characters in an attempt to take over the world in an evil manner. As often happens in these sort of productions the best parts are often unscripted and this was the case here as Jeffrina's wig flew off during a rendition of "We Will Rock You". All in all I thought that there were excellent performances by all apart from the raffle drawers who failed to draw out any of my tickets and on the way home a thought struck me that that pantomime must have been good as I had not given a single thought all afternoon as to how Lincoln City were doing.

Apart from providing excellent entertainment money has been raised for good causes in the locality with around £1000 being handed out to local groups including Scouts, Rainbows and Walcott School.. It was an excellent effort made by what is a relatively small cast and maybe BADASS would benefit from adding to their squad. If the committee were to look at the photographs on page 14 in the March/April edition of this publication they may feel that there is value in approaching a local newsletter coordinator and a local garage owner and asking them if they would like to add to their numbers!!!!!



The last couple of months have been quite busy for all of us at 1st Billinghay Scouts. The Scouts planned and delivered the Science Badge for the Cubs. This meant that they had to organise six different experiments to run for the Cubs and explain what was happening in each experiment. The experiments included making a pH indicator solution from red cabbage, investigating the action of vinegar on various substances, building structures from spaghettis and marshmallows, and seeing how exercise affects pulse rates. Both the Cubs and the Scouts enjoyed the experiments, the Cubs all earned their Science Badge and the Scouts learnt how difficult it is to plan and deliver an evening's activities.







Many of you will know that at this time of year the Scouts usually take part in an all-day competition hike known as The Elephant Yomp. Unfortunately, this year it clashed with a school trip to France, so we were unable to take part. For most people the State Pension makes up a large proportion of retirement income. The Office of National Statistics estimate that on average people spend £21,770 a year. With a full State Pension being just over £8,700 this is 40% of the income requirement so it is important to understand how it is built up and what your entitlement will be.

How it is built up?

Every month you will see National Insurance contributions deducted from your pay. It can be a large amount but most of us don't understand the benefits being built up, particularly with all the changes that have happened over recent years.

For every full year of National Insurance Contributions made you become entitled to 1/35th of the full State Pension of £164.35. Therefore in order to receive a full State Pension you need to work for 35 years.

When will I get it?

For most people retiring now the State Pension will start between their 65th and 66th birthday as we are in a transition phase. This is increasing to 68 and is likely to increase further due to increased life expectancy.

There have been some significant changes to the State Pension age, particularly for women. I would suggest that everyone checks their current State Pension age by visiting www.gov.uk/state-Pension-age. By entering simple information (no log in required) you can find out when you will receive the benefits, based on current legislation, which is of course subject to change. I would point out that if you have a personal pension or workplace pension scheme benefits can usually be taken earlier than the State Pension age and in most cases from 55.

How do I know how much I will get?

It is possible to find out how much State Pension you have already accumulated by getting a State Pension forecast. If you already have a <u>Gov.uk</u> log in, for child benefits or completing a tax return, you can find out online. Alternatively you can register for the site to get the information. If you don't want to do this then you can fill out a paper form. This is available online (search for BR19). If you are not online then give me a ring I can provide one for you. The forecast will initially tell you how many years you have made full contribution and much this works out as per week in retirement.

What if I have had time off work?

If you have been claiming certain benefits then you will have accrued the entitlement. For example, if you had time off work to have children and were claiming child benefit then this period will have been added on. That is why it is crucial for non working parents to claim child benefit.

Where one parent earns over £50,000 then child benefit has to be repaid, on a sliding scale, even

if the other parent does not work at all. In this instance it is important that it is still claimed and then repaid to ensure the non working parent builds up the State Pension entitlement.

What if the forecast shows a shortfall and I cannot work long enough to make it up?

You will have the opportunity to make up any shortfall and this can be an extremely worthwhile exercise. You will have to ask for a calculation to be done to show the cost of making up any missed years. In most instances the cost of making up 1 missed year will be recouped within a year of receiving the State Pension. If you have found out how much you need to contribute and are unsure whether it is value for money then do get in touch and we can help you make that decision. The State pension system is complex and I have not covered issues such as being Contracted Out or Additional State Pension entitlements.

Land at The former Lafford School Billinghay Parish Council



Lincolnshire County Council have recently contacted Billinghay Parish Council with an offer to the Parish to lease land at the Lafford School site behind the area for the proposed houses fronting on to Fen Road.

This offer was part of the conditions for acceptance of the Planning Application for the housing development. There is no option to buy and the Parish need not lease all the land (3.8 acres).

Conditions applying in the lease would include:

- No erection of permanent buildings
- If land was required for expansion of the school, this would be taken albeit with reasonable notice
- The charge for leasing the whole area would start at £970 per annum (Not negotiable) and be reviewed on a regular basis.

The Parish Council have been asked to respond to the offer as soon as possible, with details of proposed usage should they wish to take up the lease.

Ideas are needed as to possible use and, at present, suggestions put forward include:

- The erection of a Community Building for use as a Scout Hut (although also available for other organisations). The building would have to be of a temporary nature.
- Another possible use would be for garden allotments. We have a list of people who expressed an interest in acquiring such an allotment but this was compiled some years ago. If you are interested in having a garden allotment, let us know.

If you would like to get involved with this project, have other ideas for the possible use of this area or have any relevant comments, the Parish Council would like to hear from you.

Better still attend the Annual Parish Meeting to discuss your ideas then.


