Hello from Billinghay Parish Council

Dear Residents

Billinghay Parish Council hopes everyone remains fit and well.

November is the time of year when the Council holds its annual finance meeting to consider projects and ideas for the next financial year and to approve budgets. If you have any ideas for the village this is the perfect time to let the Council know!

At the finance meeting on 16 November, the Council will decide the funding awards for 2020 for village groups, clubs and societies. This year, for the first time, the Council hopes to support groups in becoming more sustainable with a view to maintaining what is already in place, as well as focusing on providing something new.

The Council welcomes Cllr Terry Waters as the newest member of the team following his cooption on Monday 5 October 2020. There are still four vacancies on the Parish Council, so if you are interested in becoming a councillor, please do get in touch with the Clerk for further information and the eligibility criteria. If you are aged over 18, have lived in Billinghay for over 12 months, and are on the electoral roll then you can apply.

Talks are taking place with the Conservation Officer at NKDC and local stone masons to agree the best way to repair the brick wall that separates the closed cemetery on Church Street from Old School Lane. As this is within the conservation area, special care must be taken not to detract from this area, or to harm the trees that line the path to the cemetery.

Remembrance Sunday parades and services may not be possible this year, but the Royal British Legion suggests ways in which individuals and families can commemorate and pay their respects to the fallen, including:

- Hold a small Remembrance Service in your garden
- Create a Remembrance space in your garden, planting plants that have a connection to Remembrance
- Write letters of Remembrance to veterans or serving personnel
- Create your own Remembrance artwork to display in a window

Looking ahead to Christmas, the tree will again take pride of place in the Market Place and although the tree lighting ceremony will not take place, the Council is considering other ways to ensure the village is imbued with festive cheer. Please look out for posters on the noticeboards and social media.

The Community Speed Watch scheme is active and will have been running for a full year soon. We hope to be able to provide statistics from the scheme in the next issue. New volunteers are always welcome. Please contact the Clerk to find out more.



The perfect drink for winter evenings at home.

Mulled wine can enliven the cheapest "plonk" or vin ordinaire and make it something special.

This recipe is a basic one, but almost any spice of your choice may be added – cloves and anise are often used. Some mulled wine enthusiasts also recommend the addition of a little (you can decide the amount!) brandy gives the drink that much more kick.

Ingredients

Bottle of dry red wine
 Juice and thinly pared rind of 1 lemon (or orange if you prefer)
 Half a teaspoon of nutmeg
 2-inch cinnamon stick
 3 tablespoons of sugar
 1 lemon (or orange), thinly sliced

Method

Pour the wine into a medium sized saucepan and add the juice and rind of the lemon, the nutmeg, cinnamon stick and sugar.

Place the pan over moderately high heat and bring the mixture to the boil, stirring occasionally to dissolve the sugar.

Boil the mixture for two minutes.

Remove the pan from the heat and remove and discard the lemon rind and cinnamon stick.

Pour the wine mixture into a large jug and garnish with the lemon slices.

Serve hot.

Of course, if you are too busy, you can buy a mulled wine kit and follow the instructions or even buy a ready made mulled wine that just needs heating.

Whatever way you do it - ENJOY!!

WHAT'S BEEN HAPPENING?

Warrants:

Sleaford NPT has been involved in carrying out a number of warrants in the rural villages over the past few months. Large cannabis grows were found at North Kyme and Billinghay.

Approximately 4000 plants were seized and 11 persons arrested as a result from both cannabis grows.

Speedwatch Groups:

A number of rural villages are now joining the Community Speed Watch (CSW) Scheme.

The CSW is a scheme to allow trained volunteers to address speed concerns in their communities. Sleaford rural NPT have been training up volunteers and carrying out speed checks in the villages. Some groups have had the NPT accompany them in the roadside sessions. The schemes report the details of speeding vehicles in specific areas where speed is of concern. The scheme also allows the public to get actively involved in monitoring the speed of vehicles travelling through their neighbourhood.



BILLINGHAY MEDICAL PRACTICE

"Representing patients and putting them at the heart of all we do"



In response to the COVID-19 pandemic, the Practice is using **AskMyGP** to allow patients to message the surgery directly. Rather than having to wait for an appointment this system means that your medical query should be dealt with the same day (if you message on weekdays until 4pm). This service is available for all Doctor and Practitioner appointments. If you need to see a Practice Nurse or Health Care Assistant, e.g. for a long-term condition, review, injection, blood test or a smear test, please phone the surgery.

IF YOU <u>HAVE</u> INTERNET ACCESS

ASKMYGP means that you can request help from the Practice when, where and how it suits you. Enjoy feeling more in control as you ask for help securely from your smartphone, tablet or computer. Bookmark the link in your browser so you don't forget. Access AskMyGP.

IF YOU DO NOT HAVE INTERNET ACCESS

You can contact the Practice by telephone and your request will be sent to the clinician who will contact you that day and you will be managed by phone or invited in to see the clinician. Contact us on 01526 860490.

DISPENSARY CHANGES

During this outbreak, the Dispensary is no longer accepting paper copies of prescriptions. To request your medication, please go online and order (speak with reception if you do not have an account). If you do not have internet access, phone the Dispensary on 01526 869806. Dispensary may not be able to answer the phone so please leave a CLEAR message with your NAME, DATE OF BIRTH, CONTACT MUMBER and REQUEST. If you are unable to pronounce the name of the drug you can spell it out. Your medication will be available as soon as possible but may not be within the normal 72-hour turn-around. Please DO NOT order medication if you have unopened boxes. Adequate supplies are available if everyone orders normally.

Patients are no longer being allowed into the Dispensary to collect medication. Please go to the side window to collect. Please have **ID** with you if you are collecting for someone else. The Practice has created a make-shift queuing system to help maintain Social Distancing (2m).

Please look at the website daily <u>www.billinghaymedicalpractice.co.uk</u> if you have internet access, as new information is added regularly.

Care Quality Commission (Annual Review)

The Practice was inspected in late 2016, when the rating was "Good", but the aim is to be "Outstanding". A telephone call with the CQC was arranged to take place late February which involved answering 19 'set' questions. This was carried out by our Practice Manager and GP Partners. The outcome is that the rating remains "Good". There will be another review in 2021.

Veteran Friendly GP Practice Accreditation

Over the next five years, NHS England and NHS Improvement, together with the Royal College of Practitioners, are rolling out the veteran friendly GP Practice accreditation scheme across England. This scheme, which is intended to help ensure Practices are best equipped to care for veterans and their families, has already accredited over 700 surgeries. Billinghay Medical Practice is working towards this accreditation, and will code Patient's records if they are a known military veteran.



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



The current National crisis has certainly not deterred our Skirth Road resident. This month he offers his views on Covid-19!

It is a while ago now that it became apparent that coronavirus was a very serious matter and it was certainly capable of spreading widely with great speed. I have heard it said that nothing travels faster than a virus. I am not going to dispute that statement but panic and hysteria must run it pretty close. I remember in the 1970s that a newspaper put out a scaremongering story that there was likely to be a shortage of sugar in the shops. They were proved to be right when a few weeks later there was hardly any sugar in the shops. There was however plenty of sugar in peoples' kitchens and pantries as huge numbers had been rushing out at every opportunity to buy as much sugar as they could and producers struggled to cope with increased demand

We saw a similar occurrence earlier this year as people lost all rationality and stripped the shelves of all essential and basic foods stocking up with many time as much as was sensible and ensuring there was nothing there for some key workers when they went to do their shopping at the end of the working day. Diarrhoea was not a symptom of the coronavirus and it seemed to me to be very unfortunate timing that the global pandemics should coincide with the biggest diarrhoea epidemic that the UK has ever known. As I watched the news every night and visited supermarkets and noted that everybody else was leaving the store with at least one 24 pack of toilet rolls I wondered how the sewage system would cope. Maybe all workers who were furloughed as their businesses downsized or closed would be called upon to man the country's sewage plants to try to deal with this mountain of waste material that was going to be generated. It turned out that they were not. Profiteers popped their heads above the parapet as in demand goods like

soap and hand sanitizer rocketed in price as we all followed government advice to wash our hands frequently. Dealing with COVID Restrictions

It is now October (at the time of writing) and normally we would be well on our way with rehearsals for our Panto production next February. Indeed, we have been working hard to make this happen but this year we have definitely been working with one hand tied behind our back. Yes, you guessed it in one – it is the dreaded COVID -19 and the restrictions placed upon us to stop the spread of the virus. Our small group in BADASS covers a wide range of ages from children to pensioners so we had to recognise and take into account all of our needs and vulnerabilities before we could go ahead with rehearsals.

We started our plans for the new Panto back in July when it looked like the government restrictions may soon be lifted and life would return to normal. However, after a very short respite in early August, it soon became apparent that life was not getting any easier; but we did not surrender. First, we had to study a raft of documents in order to understand exactly what it all meant to us and to our objectives. Fortunately, there is a specific government document that deals with the Performing arts and the measures we need to take. Unfortunately, there are masses of other documents, press releases and commentaries that do little but make the situation more confusing. An important lesson we learned was to work only from the original government documents and be very careful to use the ones that apply to our endeavours.



Our target was to provide a working environment that is "COVID Secure" so that we could rehearse and prepare for the Panto without compromising anyone's health and safety. At first,



we appointed a COVID Working Group and we carried out a detailed Risk Assessment to cover our activities and our use of the Village Hall. Having identified the possible risks and the means to address them, we produced our COVID Protocol. The protocol simply describes the things we need to do before, during and after our rehearsals to keep everyone safe. We then decided to appoint a Health and Safety Representative, and Rose Brown bravely stepped up to volunteer for this difficult task. Rose's job is to act as the voice of the members whenever safety is a concern. We also decided to transform our COVID Working Group into a Safety Group with the remit to consider all welfare, health and safety risks that may affect our members, our supporting staffs and our audiences. Finally, we applied for and received our very own NHS COVID-19 QR Code for use with the NHS Track and Trace app and which allows our members to book into

rehearsals with just the click of a button on their mobile phones.

Well with all this going on you would think we didn't have time to rehearse but you would be wrong. Our Director (Roz) has been cracking the whip and organising rehearsals of our new Panto "Rapunzel" but under very strict control. Each rehearsal is planned so that only the minimum number of players need to attend. For the first hour, Roz deals with the youngsters, then they go home and the older players come in to finish off the night. Not only do we have to keep numbers down but Roz has the added headache of making sure that the players on the stage have sufficient space to move around for their performance whilst still maintaining 2 metre clearances from each other. Unlike our usual shows, this Panto will involve no physical contact, so no hugging and pushing, no fighting and pulling. (Oh yes there is !! Oh no there isn't !!.) It is all very new to us but we are determined we will make it work for both us, our audiences and for the many local charities that we support. So stay tuned to this channel and we will let you know just how well things are going despite all that COVID can throw our way.





No one knows just how things will be next February. Will we be free of COVID or will we be in "Lockdown" once more? who knows. However, our members, our supporters and our audiences can all rest assured that we will be taking every precaution to ensure everyone's safety. This may mean that the numbers attending our performances will need to be reduced – so we will be offering more performance dates to make up for this. Or we may even need to move the show to later in the next year. All we know at this moment is that we will do every-thing in our power to keep us all safe and secure. With a little luck, we hope to see you all next year for our dazzling performance of Rapunzel, by Andrew O'Leary. So, until then – Stay safe.

These situations are of greater concern than any outright scam as the role of a regulated financial adviser is that of fostering trust. In the case of pension holders, a number of non-regulated advisers directed clients to transfer their defined benefit pensions, which serve as a steady and reliable stream of income, into high-risk foreign investments without adequately disclosing the level of risk. Too often this results in a devastating loss to the pension holder due to poor 'advice'.

It's one thing to fall for a random, anonymous scam. It's another thing to lose money based on poor advice. That's why it's important to seek out an adviser who is regulated. The vast majority of professional people working in the Financial Services sector conduct their business to an exceptionally high moral code and their main goal is to help as many people as possible have financial freedom to live the life they deserve.

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
