Action Taken:

Sleaford Neighbourhood Policing Team have been carrying out a number of speed checks in the rural villages of Sleaford. The team have on-going training with the use of the Unipar speed gun and issuing traffic offense reports.

PCSOs have the power to stop a mechanically propelled vehicle on a road and issue traffic offence reports under section 89 Road traffic regulations Act 1984.

PCSOs will be out at various times and days of the week carrying out speed checks and dealing with any offences.

The NPT are supporting community speed watch schemes and on occasions be present when they are carrying out their checks.

CHECK YOUR BOUNDARIES FOR OVERHANGING TREES AND SHRUBS

Now that the weather is improving and all vegetation starting to grow at a quicker rate, residents are reporting to the Council, instances where there are trees encroaching on public footpaths.

The owner or occupier of a property has a legal responsibility (Highway Act 1980 s154) to ensure that the 'public highway' adjacent to a property is not obstructed by vegetation from their property. Local Authorities also have a legal duty to ensure that public highways and street lights are unobstructed, so usually inspect roads regularly and often receive complaints from members of the general public.

The public highway, is defined by law as consisting of any verge, footway, carriageway, bridleway or footpath that is maintained at public expense and over which the public has a right of way.

When Local Authorities become aware of such obstructions, they will usually advise the property owner or occupier of the problem. They may sometimes raise the issue with an owner/occupier even if the vegetation only overhang the pavement/roadway by a small amount - this may seem 'small minded' but where should they draw the line? It is easier for all concerned to use the specified rules.

If the owner/occupier does not take corrective action within a reasonable time (the Local Authority will normally specify a time limit for the work to be completed), the Local Authority can issue a formal notice for the work to be undertaken, and if that is ignored, they can do the work and charge the owner/occupier.

It should be remembered that it is illegal under the Wildlife and Countyside Act 1981 to disturb nesting birds; so carefully check before cutting back or, if in doubt, wait until the Autumn.

The requirements

Although the Highways Act 1980 doesn't specify any actual measurements for overhanging vegetation, the requirement should be met by:

- For pedestrian areas, minimum headroom of 2.3m (7ft 6 inches).
- For carriageway and an area immediately adjacent to it (for a distance of 0.45m (1ft 6 inches)) minimum headroom of 5.2m (17ft).

In both cases, all the vegetation should be cut back vertically. See the diagrams below.

WILL THE BILLINGHAY BOYS PLEASE STAY BEHIND

Mick Wright or "Wrighty" as he was known was a well known character in Billinghay and served as a hard working Councillor for Billinghay Parish Council.

Over a period of many years, Mick gave a lot of time to research the lives of Billinghay people who served in both World Wars It was a project that was very dear to him and provides an insight of interest to many local families. During this time he made trips to the battlefields to visit as many graves of the fallen as he could.

He had hoped to put his research into a book for publication but never felt it was fully complete. Unfortunately, Mick passed away before his work came to fruition. He did, however, pass copies of his research to the Parish Council and it is split into two volumes:

- A volume detailing the involvement of Billinghay people during the conflicts
- A volume giving details of individuals and the role they played

We felt that the years of hard work that had gone into production of this research were worthy of publication and we commenced this process in the January/February 2021 issue of the Newsletter . Specific individual details can be given to relations who may request them via the Parish Office.

1916

Throughout 1915 the Germans had been on the defensive, apart from an attack at Ypres in April where poison gas was used for the first time. The Allies were initially taken by surprise, but they recovered quickly and great harm was done to the German cause by the adverse publicity they received. All the Allied attacks had been unsuccessful, but this had all been part of the learning process about this new form of warfare.

The new year was to see some of the most ferocious fighting of the whole war. It had become clear that artillery was to be the key to successful attacking. Before the war the shells had been mainly shrapnel, but it was now obvious that high explosive would be needed to destroy barbed wire and trenches. New artillery techniques had to be formulated and, with the poor communications available at the time, this was to prove very difficult. Also, by 1915 the bulk of the army consisted of untrained volunteers commanded by officers who had yet to learn their trade.

By the end of 1915, the British Army on the western front consisted of 38 divisions but there were plans for a further 19 divisions to be in France by July 1916. This would put the combined strength of the Allies at 158 divisions against 117 German divisions. Haig wanted to attack the Germans in Flanders, but Joffre favoured a joint attack on the Somme. They thought they had plenty of time and planned the attack for the middle of the year. Forty French divisions would attack south of the Somme and twenty - five British divisions to the north of it. But the Germans had plans of their own.

By the end of 1915, although the Germans had been victorious on all fronts, the end of the war had been brought no nearer. It was true that the French Army was very tired, but the British Army was, for the most part, fresh. In addition, the British naval blockade of Germany was still unbroken and increasing amounts of supplies were being brought from America.

The German general Falkenhayn was urging unrestricted submarine warfare, but at the

same time believed that if he could defeat the French then Britain would be forced to sue for peace. He therefore proposed a massive attack on the fortress of Verdun. Verdun was not strategically important, and it could be argued that the French would be in a better position without it, but Falkenhayn believed that Joffre would find it politically impossible to give any more ground and in this he guessed correctly.

The German attack started on 21st February and was to last to December. In the process the Germans gained a few kilometres of ground and lost in the region of 424,000 men, whilst the French lost about 550,000 men, most of them killed. At one time 115 divisions were crammed into a front which was only about five miles wide. Falkenhayn was right in his view that the French would not give ground, but in his attempts to bleed the enemy dry he was doing the same to his own army.

Joffre asked Haig to extend his share of the line and at the same time the date of the Somme attack was brought forward one month. The French contribution to the attack was reduced by fifteen divisions, making twenty - five divisions each, and then further reduced leaving only five French divisions.

The choice of the Somme area for a major attack was a strange one, as there was no strategic advantage to be gained in the area and the Germans had had ample time to build extremely strong fortifications which would protect them from even the heaviest bombardment. The British force was not well trained and was encouraged to believe that would only have to walk over the German lines. In this they were sadly mistaken.



The battle was preceded by a preliminary bombardment on an eighteen mile front which lasted for five days, the main effect of which was to destroy the ground over which the troops would advance. The deep dugouts had been unaffected, large amounts of barbed wire remained intact and at the end of the bombardment the Germans emerged from their shelters to cut down the attackers in their thousands. The British casualties on the first day amounted to sixty thousand, of which twenty thousand were dead, the heaviest one - day loss suffered by any army in the war. The battle continued for another four months and resulted in a gain of about ten miles. Total casualties were thought to be about 600,000 on the British side and probably just a little less for the Germans.

The first Billinghay casualty in 1916 was **Arthur William Muffitt** who died on Saturday 19th February. This was another of the names that were initially difficult to find. We could find no Arthur Mufitt in the casualty lists, but did find an Arthur William Muf**e**tt, Private 12718, 7th Battalion of the Lincolnshire Regiment and this spelling is also recorded on the North Kyme Memorial. Muffitt is also the spelling used on the Register of Honour in the church. The 1901 census lists a William and Charlotte Muffitt and a son Arthure (sic) aged six years living in Gedney which may well be the correct family.

The 7th Battalion, the Lincolnshire regiment sailed for France on 14th July 1915 and went to the front line just near Ypres for the first time on 28th July. For the next seven months they were in and out of the line. In February the Battalion moved to an area of the salient called the Bluff (see map) and on 7th February 1916 the Battalion was in trenches west of Voormzeele and St Eloi. The Bluff was a good observation point but was difficult to defend as the Germans still held the margins.

On 15th February the Lincolns were in positions on the crest of the Bluff and the trenches to the north of it up to "The Ravine" which was held by the Germans. They attacked with bombing parties, but casualties were heavy due to shellfire. The attack continued, but no progress was made. However, the Lincolns held their positions and were relieved on 17th February. Casualties in the period 14th to 17th February were 1 officer and 25 other ranks killed and 7 officers and 71 other ranks wounded and 3 missing. It is believed that Arthur Muffitt was wounded at this time. He died on 19th February 1916 and is buried in Etaples Cemetery, Pas de Calais.

Also in the 7th Battalion, the Lincolnshire Regiment was Fred Martin. His full name was **John Frederick Thornel Martin.** He was born in 1896, the son of John and Annie Martin. They had a total of ten children, the eldest being George who was born in 1894 and the youngest Les, born in 1912. The Martin family lived in the "Ferry Boat" public house, later renamed "The Captain's Table" and now a private house, which stands across the river from Dogdyke station and the "Packet Inn". He was the uncle of Sam Martin of High Street, Billinghay. John Martin operated the ferry which crossed the river Witham to where the "Packet Inn" stands. Sam remembers the fare being one and a half old pennies for a person with a bicycle. When the war broke out in 1914 George, who worked on the railways, joined the Royal Engineers and John (Fred) joined the 7th Battalion, the Lincolnshire Regiment. Jack (see below) who was only 16 at that time was too young to enlist.

After the death of Arthur Muffitt, the 7th Battalion was withdrawn from the trenches to Reninghelst and from 20th to 29th February were near Ouderdom. The last Major action by the battalion before John's death was an action to regain the ground lost on 14th February. A full-scale model of the Bluff had been made and, together with the 10th Sherwood Foresters, they practised the forthcoming attack.

On 1st March the Battalion again moved into the front line. At 4 am on the 2nd March parties of men crawled forward lying down near the German wire. Immediately the barrage stopped the Lincolns attacked taking the Germans completely by surprise. The attack was successful, but at 9 30 am the enemy opened up an extremely heavy artillery bombardment. The battalion had suffered heavy casualties and at 10 pm on 3rd March they were relieved.

It is thought that John was wounded in this attack and asked a friend to finish him off. The friend was taken prisoner and told John's family about this after the war. John must have suffered as he remained in the open for four days and during this time it snowed heavily. On 6th March he was brought in and later transferred to the Etaples Canadian Field Hospital.

Three telegrams were received in Chapel Hill on Friday 24th March 1916; the first to say that John had been wounded in action, the second to say he was gravely ill, followed by a third informing the family of his death. He is buried in Boulogne Eastern Cemetery, Pas de Calais, France. His name appears on the Chapel Hill War Memorial and also on the Roll of Honour in Billinghay Church. There were no more casualties until the first day of the Battle of the Somme.

George Maplethorpe Private 15306, 1st Battalion the Lincolnshire Regiment died on Saturday 1st July 1916. He was the son of Jabez Maplethorpe, a farmer of the Second Hurn, Billinghay and Elizabeth Maplethorpe. Twelve years old at the time of the 1901 Census, he was the eldest of a family of six including Sarah 9, Florrie 8, Agubah 5, Henry 2, and Jackson aged 1.

The 1st Battalion of the Lincolnshire Regiment took part in the opening day of the Battle of the Somme. The Battalion was part of the 62nd Brigade, which in turn was part of the 21st Division. They were in reserve at Meaulte during the first attack supplying troops for carrying purposes. At 8 am they left Meaulte detailed to carry small arms ammunition, Mills grenades and Stokes Mortar Bombs. At 1 30 pm the carrying parties began to cross No Man's Land to the captured German front line and from there to a dump on the sunken road which is now the Fricourt/Contalmaison road. Once their loads had been dumped, they returned to the old German front line. At 6 pm they were ordered to reinforce the 64th brigade and consequently moved up to Crucifix Trench where they consolidated. Total casualties for the 1st Battalion were 9 officers wounded, three other ranks killed, one hundred and five wounded and two missing. George Maplethorpe was one of the missing. He has no known grave and is commemorated on the Thiepval Memorial.

The second local man to lose his life on the Somme was **James Mason**, Private 202227, 1st/5th Battalion the West Yorkshire Regiment (Prince of Wales Own) who died on Sunday 3rd September 1916 aged 21 years. James was the son of George and Elizabeth Mason of Tattershall Bridge, Lincoln. The 1901 Census shows George Mason as a farm foreman and Elizabeth Mason living at Thorpe Tilney. At that time they had 3 sons: George aged 17, Richard aged 14 and James aged 6. I have been unable to find any further details of James but will continue to investigate. I do know that there was a Mason family living in Tattershall Bridge in the 1980s, but they have moved and I do not know if there was any connection with James. James has no known grave and is commemorated on the Thiepval Memorial.

The fighting on the Somme continued and saw the death of **Joseph Bavin**, Private 40060, 2nd Battalion the Lincolnshire Regiment on 23rd October 1916 aged 33 years. Joseph was the son of William, a farm labourer (b.1841) and Harriett (b.1844). They had lived in Church Street, but in 1901 they were living in Keys Cottages, Billinghay. The

Commonwealth War Graves Commission states that Joseph was the husband of Ruth Bavin of 65, Shaw Street, Ilkeston, Derbyshire.

On 16th October 1916 the 2nd Battalion, the Lincolnshire Regiment moved to the Citadel Camp at Meaulte on the Somme just south of Albert and went into the front line on 19th October. They moved forward through Trones Wood west of Guillemont where they stopped for dinner, moving forward again at 4 15 pm. The regimental history states that there was mud and water everywhere and a cold wind blowing.

On the night of 19th/20th they took over trenches at Les Boeufs, about two miles or so south of Bapaume, which were opposite a salient formed by two German trenches, Zenith and Eclipse. The British trenches were in a very poor condition, and it was impossible to make any improvements due to the heavy shelling which was taking place. The attack was due to begin at 9 30 pm on 23rd, but due to fog was postponed until 2 30 pm.

Following a creeping barrage, the Lincolns moved forward flanked on the left by the 2nd by 2nd Middlesex and on the right by the 2nd Rifle Brigade. They were so close to the barrage that one officer and several men were wounded by shrapnel. Unfortunately, because of the damage to Eclipse Trench the Zenith trench was packed with Germans and the first wave of Lincolns were mown down, almost to a man. The second wave also failed to make progress. Information was received that the 2nd Lincolns had been wiped out. This was not quite true, but after the action out of a starting strength of 16 officers and 470 men, only 3 officers and 200 men remained. At 5 pm the battalion was ordered back to Brigade Support. Joseph Bavin was missing. He has no known grave and is commemorated on the Thiepval Memorial.

One week later, on 27th October 1916, **Leo William Rippin** Private 27287, 1st Battalion Kings Own (Royal Lancaster Regiment) aged 24 was killed. Leo was the son of Edward and Annie Rippin who lived at 1, Victoria Terrace, Billinghay. Dennis Rippin of the Wyche was his nephew. Dennis was unable to remember much of what his mother had told him about her brother, but he did remember being told that Leo was opening a Red Cross parcel and was about to share the contents with two of his comrades who were brothers when they were all killed by a shell. I have visited the cemetery but could not find a record of two brothers buried there. Leo is buried in the Grove Town Cemetery, Meaulte. The gravestone bears the following inscription: -

RECORD HIS NAME IT IS HIS DUE REMEMBER THAT HE DIED FOR YOU

The name on the Billinghay Memorial is incorrectly spelt RIPPON; furthermore, the Register of Honour in the Church records Leo as serving in the Lincolnshire Regiment, which would seem incorrect, although it is possible that he originally served with the Lincolns, was wounded and then was allocated to another regiment.

Our Year 6 children are starting swimming lessons on Monday 14th June. Although it has been a different last year in primary education for them, we are still planning for a pool party (organised by parents/carers) and an end of year production (hopefully performed live to parents/carers).

Sports Day has been pencilled in for July and we hope to invite parents/carers into school.

Children from across school have taken part in a STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics) week which included many remote sessions with scientists and engineers to develop career aspirations in the field of science. The Y5/6 children have accessed a remote tour of the Houses of Parliament which linked to their Crime and Punishment topic.

The aim is to inspire all pupils, but particularly girls, for future career opportunities in engineering.

Each class will be carrying out work in June 2021 linked to The National Centre for Craft and Design's 'Becoming a Community Environmental Champion'. This will culminate in an ECO Day at school on the 23rd June where each class will select a theme such as climate change, plastic pollution, global warming or carbon footprints and design posters, a placard or video to highlight awareness of the human impact on the environment and the need for us to take action. These will be submitted to the NCCD in Sleaford as part of their competition.

Miss Hall has contacted Bulbs4kids and managed to secure 400 flower bulbs which our pupils plan to plant around Billinghay after agreement from the Parish Council.

We look forward to welcoming our new Reception children and parents for September to school. Hopefully we can arrange for a visit into school before the end of term. We are hugely oversubscribed for September 2021 and thank everyone for choosing our school for their children.

I would like to thank everyone for their ongoing support in what has been a challenging year and we look forward to continued success in the final term of the school year.
