## **BILLINGHAY NEEDS MORE COUNCILLORS**

If you care about our community, wish to make a positive difference, or would like to represent our residents, Billinghay Parish Council would love to hear from you!

#### What is a Parish Council?

Created by the Local Government Act 1894, a parish council is a democratically elected corporate body, the grass-root level of government, responsible for representing its electorate and delivering local services to improve the quality of life and wellbeing within its community. Billinghay Parish Council consists of 11 councillors, employs 3 members of staff, and is responsible for a cemetery and closed churchyard and closed graveyard, 60 acres (approx.) of farming allotments and a Pinfold.

#### Who are Parish Councillors?

Parish Councillors are community champions, who give up their time to represent their community and improve the lives of those in their area.

#### What do Parish Councillors do?

As part of the council, councillors:

- manage buildings and community spaces
- decide finances to deliver services
- influence and shape development policies for the parish
- comment on Parish planning applications
- improve the quality of life and the environment in their local area
- consult to identify issues which are important to the lives of the residents
- work to bring about improvements through local projects
- lobby other service providers and work in partnership with other parishes and agencies
- and, most importantly, work with the community and residents the Council serves.

Although unpaid, training is provided, and expenses can be claimed in certain circumstances.

#### Who can stand for co-option as a Parish Councillor?

- Anyone aged 18 years or over,
- Is a British citizen, an eligible Commonwealth citizen, or a citizen of any other member state of the European Union **and**,
- Meets at least one of the four qualifications below

#### Other qualifications required for standing for election as a Parish Councillor

As well as meeting the criteria above, to be able to stand as a candidate at a parish council election in England or a community council election in Wales: -

(a) You are, and will continue to be, registered as a local government elector for the parish/ community in which you wish to stand from the day of your nomination onwards;

(b) You have occupied as owner or tenant any land or other premises in the parish/ community area during the whole of the 12 months before the day of your nomination and the day of election; (c) Your main or only place of work during the 12 months prior to the day of your nomination and the day of election has been in the parish/community area;

(d) You have lived in the parish/community area or within three miles of it during the whole of the 12 months before the day of your nomination and the day of election.

Councillors are expected to comply with Code of Conduct, the 7 (Nolan) Principles for Life in Public Office, which includes openness, honesty, integrity, selflessness, objectivity, and leadership, and Council Policies, such as the social media policy.

#### What will I gain from being a Councillor?

Satisfaction of making a difference in your local community. Councillors have the opportunity to develop a range of skills including: PR, marketing, project managing, IT, analytical, and fundraising skills, and will build a strong networking with a wide range of individuals and groups

#### Did you know that you can nominate yourself for co-option?

#### **Meetings**

Billinghay Parish Council usually holds 12 ordinary meetings a year to which you are summoned to attend. Meetings usually last two hours - but this can vary. In addition to this, the Annual Meeting of the Parish Council is held annually in May, a Finance Meeting is held in November, and the Chairman hosts and Annual Parish Meeting.

The Council has several committees to research in detail, policies, planning, finances, environmental and recreational matters, staffing matters, and make recommendations to the full Council. Council and committee meetings are held face to face, unless legislation from government allows otherwise (for example, during the Covid-19 pandemic lockdowns).

The Council may organise other events throughout the year, most notably the Christmas Tree Lighting Ceremony on the first Wednesday in December.

#### Length of service

Once elected, parish councillors sit on the council for a maximum of four years. If they then want to stay in the post, they can stand for re-election. The next election is in May 2023. This does not mean that you must stay in post for four years; if you find being a councillor is not for you, or you can no longer meet the commitment, then you can stand down.

# **FIX MY STREET**



# Fed up with problems such as potholes, broken paving slabs, street lighting and overgrown hedges?

If everyone who is affected also reported the problem direct to Lincolnshire County Council, the seriousness of the problem would be emphasised. The identity of the person reporting the problem can remain anonymous unless they choose to show their name.

Residents without computer access can still report problems via the Parish Council who will pass on details to Lincolnshire County Council. We will continue to do this but we can only register the complaint once. Numerous residents reporting the same problem will have a greater impact on prioritising problems.

Therefore, we would recommend that you use the system provided by the County Council and report the problems directly to them using the Fix My Street system on the LCC website.

Community Speedwatch is a national initiative where active members of local communities join with the support of the Police to monitor speeds of vehicles using speed detection devices.

Vehicles exceeding the speed limit are referred to the Police with the aim of educating drivers to reduce their speeds. Speeding continues to be a concern for many communities in both rural and urban environments.

Volunteers receive appropriate training and are supported by neighbourhood policing team staff. The scheme aims to cater for the problem of real or perceived speed related offending, and through partnership with the community it is to be used in circumstances that are necessary, justifiable and proportionate in order to:

- Reduce death and injury on the roads
- Improve the quality of life for local communities
- Reduce the speed of vehicles to the speed limit
- Increase public awareness of inappropriate speed

The latest statistics we have received relating to the activities of the Billinghay Speedwatch Group are as below:

The Speedwatch Group are struggling for members to go out. If you are concerned about speeding in the village why not contact the Parish Clerk and she will arrange for training - it only needs a few hours of your time.

Currently the Group are in discussions with the Lincolnshire Road Safety Partnership to see if they can operate on Fen Road as the Walcott Road closure has meant Fen Road has become an alternative route even though it is not a designated deviation.

Sleaford Neighbourhood Policing Team have been carrying out a number of speed checks in the rural villages of Sleaford. The team have on-going training with the use of the Unipar speed gun and issuing traffic offense reports.

PCSOs have the power to stop a mechanically propelled vehicle on a road and issue traffic offence reports under section 89 Road traffic regulations Act 1984.

PCSOs will be out at various times and days of the week carrying out speed checks and dealing with any offences.

The NPT are supporting community speed watch schemes and on occasions be present when they are carrying out their checks.

# WILL THE BILLINGHAY BOYS PLEASE STAY BEHIND

Mick Wright or "Wrighty" as he was known was a well known character in Billinghay and served as a hard working Councillor for Billinghay Parish Council.

Over a period of many years, Mick gave a lot of time to research the lives of Billinghay people who served in both World Wars It was a project that was very dear to him and provides an insight of interest to many local families. During this time he made trips to the battlefields to visit as many graves of the fallen as he could.

He had hoped to put his research into a book for publication but never felt it was fully complete. Unfortunately, Mick passed away before his work came to fruition. He did, however, pass copies of his research to the Parish Council and it is split into two volumes:

- A volume detailing the involvement of Billinghay people during the conflicts
- A volume giving details of individuals and the role they played

We felt that the years of hard work that had gone into production of this research were worthy of publication and we commenced this process in the January/February 2021 issue of the Newsletter . Specific individual details can be given to relations who may request them via the Parish Office. The next chapter is detailed below:

## 1917 Part 2

After the failure of the Nivelle offensive, Haig transferred his attention to the north where General Sir Herbert Plumer had been appointed Commander of the Second Army in May 1915 and for two years had been planning an attack on the Messines Ridge south of Ypres. Despite his appearance, which may well have been the inspiration for Colonel Blimp, Plumer was one of the best Allied Generals of the First World War. He understood the value of sound planning and had organised his attack around the detonation of 20 mines - see map below for details.



The preliminary bombardment began on 21<sup>st</sup> May, increased in intensity a week later and early in the morning of 7<sup>th</sup> June the mines exploded, killing an estimated 10,000 men. Nine divisions attacked behind a creeping barrage. The attack was a complete success, all the preliminary objectives being taken in the first three hours and the final objectives by midday. The Germans counter-attacked but were beaten back losing even more ground in the process and by 14<sup>th</sup> June the battle was over. It was notable for the fact that it was the only battle since 1914 in which the attacker had lost less men than the defenders (17.000 against 25,000).

Haig was eager to continue with this success and against the advice of Plumer and against the opposition of Lloyd George made plans for a major breakthrough. The offensive started on 31<sup>st</sup> July, but the German defence in depth held the British advance. Attempts to continue the battle were further hampered by heavy rain which turned the battlefield to a quagmire, made worse by artillery fire. Losing patience, Haig increased the area of responsibility of the Second Army front further north and once again, on 20<sup>th</sup> September, Plumer attacked with carefully planned moves which never outran his artillery support. Two further attacks on 26<sup>th</sup> September (Polygon Wood) and 4<sup>th</sup> October (Broodseinde) enabled the British to take the ridge east of Ypres.

Once again Haig was encouraged and decided to continue his attack towards Passchendaele Ridge. The army floundered in the mud against a reinforced German army, but Haig continued with his attack and Passchendaele Ridge was finally taken on 6<sup>th</sup> November. The offensive cost over 300,000 British casualties and slightly less on the German side. The fighting in this area took a heavy toll of Billinghay men, seven were lost during this offensive.

**Jacob Wattam,** Private 40214, 2<sup>nd</sup> Battalion the Lincolnshire Regiment, died on Tuesday 31<sup>st</sup> July aged 32 years. Jacob was born on 6<sup>th</sup> March 1885 and baptised on12th April at Billinghay. He was the son of Grayson Wattam (a labourer) and Rebecca Wattam (nee Maplethorpe) of Billinghay. Henry Chamberlain said Jacob had a brother, Jim. There was also a daughter, Charlotte. Mrs Spencer of 38, High Street, Billinghay, who was Jacob's niece, told me that her uncle had said he did not want to go to war as he did not wish to kill anybody; but like thousands of others, he went nevertheless, although he did tell his family that he would not be coming back. Jacob died at the Battle of Pilckem Ridge, which took place between 31stst July 1917 and 2<sup>nd</sup> August.

The objectives of the 8<sup>th</sup> Division, of which the 2<sup>nd</sup> Lincolns were a part, were to be taken by the 25<sup>th</sup> Brigade with the 2<sup>nd</sup> Lincolns on the right, the Royal Irish Rifles in the centre and the 2<sup>nd</sup> Rifle Brigade on the left. The second Berkshires were in support. Westhoek Ridge was in our possession but there was still heavy machine gun fire for Glencorse Wood and from snipers in several houses on the Westhoek Road which were still in enemy hands. The 2<sup>nd</sup> Lincolns formed up and at 6.50 am advanced in infantry formation. At 9.00 am they arrived at their position of deployment, all companies reporting casualties. At 9.40am they advanced, D company on the right, A in the centre and D on the left. B company was to act as moppers up. They pushed to the edge of the ridge, but enemy machine guns caused heavy casualties. The British barrage was not accurate, and it allowed the defenders to fire continuously on the Lincolns. Further advancement was impossible and the Lincolns consolidated the reverse slope. At 11.50 am and 1.10 pm counter attacks were easily repulsed and German reinforcements took heavy casualties. At 2.30pm the Germans counter attacked again but were driven back. The consolidation proceeded and was completed after dark.

Losses were as follows: 2 officers and 31 other ranks killed and two officers died of wounds, 6 officers and 27 other ranks wounded and 27 other ranks missing. One of the missing was Jacob Wattam. He has no known grave and is commemorated on the Ypres (Menin Gate) Memorial, Ypres.

Two men from Billinghay were killed while serving in the Artillery and they were brothers. **Harry Sharp**, Gunner 124963, 16<sup>th</sup> Howitzer Battery, Royal Garrison Artillery who died on Thursday 2<sup>nd</sup> August 1917 aged 30 years. Harry was born on 6th November 1917 in Billinghay, the son of Thomas and Mary Sharpe of Billinghay and the husband of the late Nellie Sharpe of Stamford. He was the brother of **James Sharpe**, of whom more later. Unfortunately, I have not been able to find a lot of information about him, but he is buried in Duhallow A.D.S. Cemetery, Ypres. The name on the Billinghay War Memorial is spelled SHARPE.

Walter Vickers was unique among the names of the First World War dead in that he had a son who was still alive at the time of writing. I was able to interview him and, although he was not able to provide a great deal of information about him, it did bring the War and the men involved a lot nearer. Walter was Private 40434, 4<sup>th</sup> Battalion, The Worcestershire Regiment (the same Battalion as Ernest Gosling, mentioned earlier). He died on 17<sup>th</sup> August 1917. He was the husband of Agnes Vickers of High Street, Heckington, Lincolnshire, The family lived at Garwick near Heckington. They had two sons, Tom born in 1915 and Walter, named after his father who was born in 1917, after his father's death. Obviously, Tom did not remember Walter, but he told me that his father was a labourer for Bowsers who farmed in the area. In 1929, when Tom was 14, he went to work as a day boy for Sardesons who farmed at Howell, near Heckington. His wage was fourteen shillings (70p) a week. Working there was Amos Bell who had been in the same Battalion as Walter. In fact, Amos had been the person who had helped Walter put on his pack just before they left the trenches. He also told Tom that after they went over the top, he never saw Walter again. After Walter's death Agnes moved to High Street Heckington and later lived in the alms houses overlooking the green. She never remarried and died in her late eighties. The family was guite large and there are still relatives living in the village. I have already mentioned Walter's brother, Joe, who worked as a saddler for Robinson's of Billinghay all his working life. Walter has no known grave but is commemorated on the Tyne Cot Memorial.

There is some confusion over the name of the next man to die. The Commonwealth War Graves Commission has him as **J Cottingham**, Serjeant 14712, 8<sup>th</sup> Battalion, the Lincolnshire Regiment, who died on 18<sup>th</sup> August aged 31 years. Serjeant Cottingham was the son of Thomas Cottingham of Dogdyke Bank, Dogdyke, Lincoln. He is commemorated on the Chapel Hill Memorial but must have lived in the parish of Billinghay with Dogdyke as his name is on the Register of Honour in Billinghay Parish Church. The Memorial in Chapel Hill records his name as G Cottingham and on the 1901 Census return a George Cottingham aged 13 living in Pelhams Land. He was an apprentice and provisions dealer.

The details of George's death are not known as the 8<sup>th</sup> Battalion were not in action on 18<sup>th</sup> August 1917, so it is probably that he was wounded in an earlier action and died later. The 8<sup>th</sup> Battalion had been out of the line in billets in Beaufort, west of Arras for the whole of May, but early in June they moved north to an area just south of Ypres. The last action that the Battalion was in before his death started on 31<sup>st</sup> July north of Wambeke. D Company of the Lincolnshires formed part of the right defensive flank for the 4<sup>th</sup> Middlesex. The attack commenced at 3.50 am but the Lincolns were not drawn into the fighting until 4.30 am. At 7.50 am the main attack commenced and B Company attacked, supported by C Company with the line from July Farm – Wam Farm – the Wambeke River as the final objective. The line was reached and contact made with the Somersets on the right, but there was no trace of the Middlesex on the left nor of D Company. Several German attacks were broken up by shellfire. The Battalion was relieved on the night of the 1<sup>st of</sup> August. Total casualties were 3 officers killed, two wounded and two missing. Casualties for other ranks were not classified but totalled 85 (all of D company). It is quite possible that George was wounded at that time. He is buried at Oosttavaerne Wood Cemetery, Heuvalland, West Vlaanderen, less than a mile away from the site of the above action.

**John Edward Taylor** Private 31896, 6<sup>th</sup> Battalion Kings Own Yorkshire Light Infantry, died on 24<sup>th</sup> August 1917 aged 29 years. He was born on 4<sup>th</sup> September 1888, the son of John and Harriet Taylor (nee Wilson) of York Terrace, Billinghay. John Taylor was recorded as being a Farmer of North Kyme. John Edward and his wife, Ellen, had a son

John Christy Taylor born 25<sup>th</sup> December1915 and baptised on 17<sup>th</sup> May 1916. Henry Chamberlain told me that the son was brought up by his grandparents. John has no known grave and is commemorated on the Tyne Cot Memorial.

**James Sharp**, acting Bombardier 306<sup>th</sup> Siege Battery, Royal Garrison Artillery, died on 11<sup>th</sup> September 1917 aged 40 Years. James Sharp was born on 17<sup>th</sup> October 1876 and baptised on 5<sup>th</sup> November at Billinghay. He was the son of Thomas Richard Sharpe, Cottager next to the Mill Inn, West Street (1847-1932) and Mary (nee Wilson), 1849-1905. He was the husband of Emily Sharp of 191, Dalling Road, Hammersmith, London and the brother of Harry, (see above). The Billinghay War Memorial records his rank as Gunner and his surname as SHARPE, which is correct. James is buried in Bard Cottage Cemetery, Ypres, just a mile away from his brother, Harry.

The last man from Billinghay to be killed in 1917 was **Ernest Cunnington**, Private, 1<sup>st</sup> Battalion Kings Own, Royal Lancaster Regiment who died on 9<sup>th</sup> October 1917 aged 26 years. I did have some trouble tracing Ernest, but now believe he was born in Boston. On the 1901 Census his mother is Lillie, a widow and he had three brothers John IT (born 1892/3), George (born 1893/4) and Frank (born 1898/9). Ernest married Lillian and was described as a straw presser. They had 2 daughters, Gwenllian Margaret (born January 9<sup>th</sup>, 1913, baptised 9<sup>th</sup> February 1913) and Cara Ellen (born 4<sup>th</sup> January 1916, baptised on 11<sup>th</sup> June 1916)

At the time of the second baptism, he was recorded as "Soldier, Pte. 9<sup>th</sup> Lincs High Street Billinghay." In the history of the Lincolnshire Regiment 1914-1918 which lists those killed in the First World War, I can find no mention of Ernest Cunnington. The casualties for the 9<sup>th</sup> Battalion number about 12 in total so it does not look as if it was a frontline outfit. However, the Commonwealth War Graves Commission record an Ernest Cunnington, as above, who was the husband of Lillian McManus (formerly Cunnington) of 12, Castle Street, Lincoln. Furthermore, the Register of Honour in the village church does not list Ernest as having served in the Lincolnshire Regiment, so I believe that the entry above is the correct one. It may be that he was wounded and transferred to another Regiment on his recovery. That would have been unusual, but not unknown. Ernest has no known grave but is commemorated on the Tyne Cot Memorial.

The main effect of the fighting in the north was to leave no reserves for his final attack of 1917 at Cambrai. The initial attack was a complete success, advancing about 6 kilometres, but there were insufficient troops to hold the gains and a week later the Germans counter attacked and retook all the lost ground. Both sides then settled back into trench warfare.

# **COMMUNITY GRANTS SCHEME**

Billinghay Parish Council is committed to supporting community life. The Parish Council operates a scheme for small Community Grants.

The Council has a small budget for the award of grants. They may only however be used if its use will benefit some or all of the residents or some or all of the area and where the benefit obtained is commensurate with expenditure incurred.

Grants are considered annually at the Council Policy and Finance Committee meeting in November, before being submitted to the Full Council. Grants must meet the Council's grant criteria. The Grant request must be submitted on the Billinghay Parish Council Application for Small Grants Form. Copies of the application form can be requested from the Parish Council Office or downloaded from the Billinghay Parish Council website

All applications must be accompanied by appropriate accounts and or supporting financial information. Forms and the supporting information must be returned to the Parish Clerk by the 31st October .

We did place a reminder in our July/August issue to prompt applications. However, due to the problems caused by Covid regulations, we realise that some clubs and organisations have been unable to meet on a regular basis. We are, therefore, asking any group wishing to put in a grant application to have the form and supporting documentation in the possession of the Parish Clerk by 7th November at the latest.

October is CyberSecurity month so I felt is appropriate to re-iterate some of the points made in a previous article about keeping yourself safe online.

#### 1. Be on the lookout for suspicious emails

Phishing is an attempt, usually through email, to gather personal information or to compromise technology for the purpose of financial gain or other malicious activity. Phishing emails typically include a link to a fraudulent site or an attachment containing malware. Can you tell a real email from a scam one? Here are a few pointers:

■ The URL (the sender's address) looks odd, is spelt incorrectly, or doesn't match previous examples.

The email contains poor spelling, grammar or syntax.

■ The message asks for personal information, such as passwords, or has links to sites requesting your log-in details.

■ You're not expecting anything from the sender or there's surprising news (such as winning a competition you didn't enter).

■ The email says you must act now to avoid losing money or having your account access cut off (scammers often try to get you to act quickly without thinking).

■ Something just seems wrong – trust your intuition and common-sense judgement erring on the side of caution. Be safe not sorry.

#### 2 Beware of email hacking

Never transfer money on the basis of an email alone. Unfortunately, email is a favoured channel for cybercriminals and email hacking – the taking over of someone's account without their knowledge – is becoming much more prevalent and is now a common feature of financial fraud. You may think you have just received an email from a trusted source, such as the bank, but you could have received a message from a criminal who has taken control of their email account. It is particularly important you double check with the sender before transferring any money which has been requested by email. Don't check by replying to the email you've received – you may be communicating with the fraudster – always call and speak to the person you believe to be sending it.

#### **3 Protect your accounts**

Passwords are an obvious way to prevent unauthorised access to accounts, although they need to be strong, long and unguessable to be effective. Use three random words to create a memorable 'passphrase' and then mix in some symbols and numbers (the longer you make your passphrase the better). Always use a unique passphrase for each account that holds your most sensitive information. This is especially important for your email account as it contains so much personal information and can be used as the gateway to many of your other online accounts. No matter how strong your passphrase is, there is always a chance it could be hacked or stolen through no fault of your own. Adding multi-factor authentication provides an extra layer of protection by having a site or service verify your identity using two different elements. By using something you know, like a passphrase, and something that only you have, such as a onetime code or fingerprint, you can help secure your email account.

#### 4 Limit what you store

If your email account becomes your document store, then, if compromised, a hacker could gain access to all of the information you are stockpiling. Every attachment you ever sent or received, every conversation, every photo, contracts, invoices, tax forms, reset passwords for every other account – sometimes even passwords or credit card PINs! To minimise risk, only save limited information within your email account. Save any sensitive personal information outside of the mailbox in secure document repositories.

#### 5 Wi-fi access is not always secure

It's easy to stay connected with public wi-fi access points everywhere – in restaurants, coffee shops and shopping centres – but accessibility can come with risk. Public wi-fi 'hotspots' are exactly that – public – they offer no privacy or protection to your data and communications. Never use public wi-fi to access sensitive information, like your email account, or enter log-in details or credit card information while connected to it.

If you are ever unsure, contact a friend, family member or our office and tell them what is happening. We receive phone calls regularly from our clients asking our opinion on an email they have received. 2 heads are, as the saying goes, better than one after all.

## **CHRISTMAS PUNCH**

Preparation: 10 Mins (plus 8 hours freezing)

#### Ingredients:

Bunch of red grapes

750ml Prosecco

1 litre Cloudy Apple Juice

lce

250ml Sloe Gin

50ml Herbal Liqueur (Jagermeister is fine)

1 ball of stem ginger (finely sliced) plus 2 tbsp of the syrup

3-4 sprigs of rosemary

1 Clementine (finely sliced)

#### Method

#### Step 1

The day before you want to serve, put the grapes in the freezer for around 8 to 12 hours or until frozen.

Chill the prosecco and apple juice in the fridge

#### Step 2

When you are ready to serve, put the frozen grapes and a generous handful of ice in a large 2 - 3 litre bowl and pour all of the remaining ingredients on the top.

Stir gently to combine then serve.

It will sit well for up to three hours before putting the ice in.

#### BILLINGHAY CHURCH OF ENGLAND PRIMARY SCHOOL

At the time of writing we have just started another school year and thankfully we are back to some sort of normality after what has been unprecedented times.

Our pupils have just taken part in a non-curriculum week in school entitled Lincolnshire Week. Miss Hall organised for many different visitors to come into school and talk to our pupils and inspire them to look at opportunities in many different careers.

It was fantastic to return to St Michael's Church for our Harvest Festival Service, after not being able to celebrate in church due to Covid last year. It was wonderful to see so many parents / carers in church. Next our thoughts turn to Christmas Productions! Thank you to everyone who donated produce. All donations will go to Sleaford New Life Church Community Larder.

We yet again achieved the School Games Mark Gold Award last year and have already made a strong start to the year in terms of achieving the award for 2021-22. After a year of virtual events it is great to get our pupils back to face to face events with local schools in the Carres Sports Partnership.

As a school we take part in many different research projects to continue to enhance the quality of education that we offer. This year we signed up for and were successful in gaining a place on the National Centre for Excellence in Teaching of Mathematics 'Mastering Number Programme'. This project aims to advance secure firm foundations in the development of good number sense for all children from Reception through to Year 1 and Year 2. The aim over time is that children will leave Year 2 with increased fluency in calculation and a greater confidence and flexibility with number. Developing fluency would mean children don't count on in their heads or on their fingers and this restrains flexible thinking. This in turn frees up short term memory space and aids metacognition and developing reasoning skills.

We are once again supporting Operation Christmas Child in school this year. This is an opportunity for members of the school and local community to come together and pack shoe boxes full of gifts that will go to children in areas of the world who are much less fortunate than we are, many of whom would otherwise not get a gift at Christmas. School has signed up as a collection centre for any shoe boxes and welcome anyone who has a shoe box to bring them into school before 22<sup>nd</sup> November. Please see the website <u>Operation Christmas Child (samaritans-purse.org.uk)</u> for ideas as to what gifts can be packed in a shoe box. Operation Christmas Child are asking for a donation of £5 per shoe box to go towards distribution. To help with this, school are holding a cake stall and raffle after half term and the Methodist Chapel are holding a coffee morning and raffle on the 30<sup>th</sup> October. All proceeds will go towards the £5 donation for each shoe box.

The admissions process for pupils into Reception for September 2022, coordinated by Lincolnshire County Council School Admissions, opens on the 15<sup>th</sup> November 2021 and closes on the 15<sup>th</sup> January 2022.
