## **COUNCIL NEWS**

**Parish council elections** are due to be held in May 2023, and this is an opportunity for residents to join the parish council and get involved in making decisions within our local community. It seems a long time away, but in fact the year will be busy and the time will go quickly. There are currently still a number of parish council vacancies, so if you're interested in learning more about the role, please contact the Clerk on 07483 346143.

We would very much like to hear from the 18 to 30 age group, as joining Parish Council is a way of ensuring that the younger generation are represented. Being a Parish Councillor is a great way of enhancing many skills that can benefit career opportunities and obtain funded training that is helpful in all areas of life. Employers are increasingly happy to see evidence of community involvement, it's also a way of meeting people and learning more about the area we call home.

#### Parish Council Grants

At the recent Annual Finance Meeting, a Parish council grant of £4000.00 was awarded to Billinghay Athletic Football club, to renew the roof on the on the football changing rooms. The roof has previously been repaired several times, and now needs complete renewal. Club members have done a lot of work renovating showers, and facilities.

Funding of £90 was awarded to Rainbows, for the annual cost of room hire, to enable organisers not to worry about being able to cover the cost. Members pay subscriptions, which go towards the purchase of materials required for the members to work towards badges.

Money was also awarded to The Village Hall Committee towards stage curtains.

**The Parish Council receive funding (the Precept**) collected by NKDC to cover the costs required to administer finances for the Parish. It was agreed by Councillors that this amount should remain at the same figure requested for the last 2 years at  $\pounds$ 45125.00.

### **Emergency Plan**

Please think about getting involved with Billinghay Emergency Plan, we are looking for volunteers to join. We have all been made aware that at times some help is much needed. Throughout events of the last year, we have seen amazing kindness and neighbours getting to know each other better.

We will keep you informed in the newsletter, as the Plan review is underway.

We would like to take this opportunity to welcome new residents to Billinghay, our village is growing and new housing continues to be built. If you have recently moved here, we hope you will think about joining some of our local groups or contributing to the newsletter.

Many volunteers kindly give their time to deliver the newsletter and we keep a list of people willing to do this for their neighbours. It's a great way of having a walk, meeting people and giving something back. Get in touch if you can spare a little time every 2 months to help!

## PLANNING

Residents have shown interest in seeing what changes are planned for the village particularly by way of new developments or changes to existing properties. The planning Department of North Kesteven District Council already take steps to notify residents that they think will be affected by any planning applications in accordance with the laid down guidelines. In addition the Neighbourhood Plan included significant proposals that were adopted to ensure that development was in accordance with community wishes.

Even so the Parish Office does receive enquiries as to what is being planned and, to keep residents informed, we are listing in the Newsletter any new applications received since the previous issue. The Council do scrutinise each application and, where necessary, put in their own comments.

### ROAD CLOSURES IN THE AREA

Carriageway Reconstruction Works are being planned for **Early March** on Witham Bank Tattershall.

The Work will be carried out between the Timberland Drove and North Tilney Drove Junctions.

Dates for these works have been agreed with contractors Balfour Beatty, and the relevant Road Closure & Diversion Route has been booked. Dates for works are between 4<sup>th</sup> March and the 25th of March ( Daytime working only ).

Working Shift Hours (7.30am- 17.00pm ). Contractors on site and LCC will endeavour to work to the identified shift patterns, but there may be elements outside their control, including adverse weather, that may result in changes on site if required.

## **BILLINGHAY NEEDS MORE COUNCILLORS**

If you care about our community, wish to make a positive difference, or would like to represent our residents, Billinghay Parish Council would love to hear from you!

### What is a Parish Council?

Created by the Local Government Act 1894, a parish council is a democratically elected corporate body, the grass-root level of government, responsible for representing its electorate and delivering local services to improve the quality of life and wellbeing within its community. Billinghay Parish Council consists of 11 councillors, employs 3 members of staff, and is responsible for a cemetery and closed churchyard and closed graveyard, 60 acres (approx.) of farming allotments and a Pinfold.

#### Who are Parish Councillors?

Parish Councillors are community champions, who give up their time to represent their community and improve the lives of those in their area.

### What do Parish Councillors do?

As part of the council, councillors:

- manage buildings and community spaces
- decide finances to deliver services
- influence and shape development policies for the parish
- comment on Parish planning applications
- improve the quality of life and the environment in their local area
- consult to identify issues which are important to the lives of the residents
- work to bring about improvements through local projects
- lobby other service providers and work in partnership with other parishes and agencies
- and, most importantly, work with the community and residents the Council serves.

Although unpaid, training is provided, and expenses can be claimed in certain circumstances.

#### Who can stand for co-option as a Parish Councillor?

- Anyone aged 18 years or over,
- Is a British citizen, an eligible Commonwealth citizen, or a citizen of any other member state of the European Union **and**,
- Meets at least one of the four qualifications below

### Other qualifications required for standing for election as a Parish Councillor

As well as meeting the criteria above, to be able to stand as a candidate at a parish council election in England or a community council election in Wales: -

(a) You are, and will continue to be, registered as a local government elector for the parish/ community in which you wish to stand from the day of your nomination onwards;

(b) You have occupied as owner or tenant any land or other premises in the parish/ community area during the whole of the 12 months before the day of your nomination and the day of election; (c) Your main or only place of work during the 12 months prior to the day of your nomination and the day of election has been in the parish/community area;

(d) You have lived in the parish/community area or within three miles of it during the whole of the 12 months before the day of your nomination and the day of election.

Councillors are expected to comply with Code of Conduct, the 7 (Nolan) Principles for Life in Public Office, which includes openness, honesty, integrity, selflessness, objectivity, and leadership, and Council Policies, such as the social media policy.

#### What will I gain from being a Councillor?

Satisfaction of making a difference in your local community. Councillors have the opportunity to develop a range of skills including: PR, marketing, project managing, IT, analytical, and fundraising skills, and will build a strong networking with a wide range of individuals and groups

#### Did you know that you can nominate yourself for co-option?

#### **Meetings**

Billinghay Parish Council usually holds 12 ordinary meetings a year to which you are summoned to attend. Meetings usually last two hours - but this can vary. In addition to this, the Annual Meeting of the Parish Council is held annually in May, a Finance Meeting is held in November, and the Chairman hosts an Annual Parish Meeting.

The Council has several committees to research in detail, policies, planning, finances, environmental and recreational matters, staffing matters, and make recommendations to the full Council. Council and committee meetings are held face to face, unless legislation from government allows otherwise (for example, during the Covid-19 pandemic lockdowns).

The Council may organise other events throughout the year, most notably the Christmas Tree Lighting Ceremony on the first Wednesday in December.

#### Length of service

Once elected, parish councillors sit on the council for a maximum of four years. If they then want to stay in the post, they can stand for re-election. The next election is in May 2023. This does not mean that you must stay in post for four years; if you find being a councillor is not for you, or you can no longer meet the commitment, then you can stand down.

## Former Sheltered Housing Scheme review of Communal Lounges 2022

North Kesteven District Council are presently undertaking a review of communal lounges within their former sheltered housing schemes. They will be collating information on their use by tenants at this present time and looking to highlight opportunities for maximising their use in the future.

The objective is to identify those groups which may be interested in either setting up activities for the benefit of our residents or using the rooms as a base for co-ordination of their group. The overarching purpose of this work is to identify opportunities for the re-establishment of waned communal activities and to highlight new opportunities for resident participation in self-sustaining activities. To that end they are also asking the Parish Council to assist in this process.

NKDC are genuinely seeking to ascertain tenants' views on the current and future use of their communal lounge as they want communal lounges to remain open and used for the benefit of the residents and local community, wherever possible. They are trying to encourage and facilitate resident participation in, and the organisation of, activities at their communal lounge. They need to identify voluntary organisations to become involved in the arrangement of activities where pandemic related restrictions are lifted by the Council.

The project is **NOT** a cost cutting measure nor the start of a regime of communal lounge closures. It **IS** an exercise to encourage maximum use of communal lounges across the district to benefit the health and welfare of our former sheltered housing scheme residents.

### FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

#### Q: Why does the Council wish to keep the communal lounges open?

**A:** NKDC want to ensure they are kept open to aid the welfare and health of residents. We are aware that due to the pandemic, the last few years have been a difficult time for our tenants. We believe communal lounges are ideally suited to be the base for activities which are so important in preventing isolation and promoting social interaction.

#### Q: Isn't the review all about cost saving and closure of the communal lounges?

**A:** No, NKDC are looking to maximise the use of communal lounges. They are aware that the inevitable precautionary Covid pandemic measures put into place for the use of these areas, may have curtailed some of the previously established activities and uses. They are keen to not only re-establish those activities but to expand opportunities for resident participation.

## Q: Why should I be interested in organising or participating in activities at my communal lounge?

**A:** Social interaction with neighbours and other members of the community is a great way to meet new friends, continue old friendships, and to pursue pastimes. Not only that, but engagement with health and wellbeing activities increases the likelihood of good feelings, such as contentment and purpose.

## Q: Doesn't the Council's restrictions on the use of communal lounges mean that activities at my communal lounge must stop, so what is the point of this review?

**A:** Only visits to the communal lounges by those not resident at the scheme are presently not allowed. Tenants can come together communally and continue with their own arranged activities, but care must be taken that Covid precautions such as hand sanitising, ventilation, and other reasonable measures are maintained. No external

organisers or visitors are permitted at present, although this situation is subject to review in the coming months. Therefore, it is essential that plans for activities are made now in preparation for when the restrictions are lifted.

## Q: How will I make my views heard and how will I know what will happen to my lounge?

**A**: NKDC will be liaising very closely with you. They want to know what your thoughts are and to understand the things that are of importance to you. To that end wherever possible, they will endeavour to gather your opinions and to consider your views. They intend also to keep you up to date with decisions and will keep you informed of the rationale upon which those decisions are made.

## **FIX MY STREET**



## Fed up with problems such as potholes, broken paving slabs, street lighting and overgrown hedges?

If everyone who is affected also reported the problem direct to Lincolnshire County Council, the seriousness of the problem would be emphasised. The identity of the person reporting the problem can remain anonymous unless they choose to show their name.

Residents without computer access can still report problems via the Parish Council who will pass on details to Lincolnshire County Council. We will continue to do this but we can only register the complaint once. Numerous residents reporting the same problem will have a greater impact on prioritising problems.

Therefore, we would recommend that you use the system provided by the County Council and report the problems directly to them using the **Fix My Street system on the LCC website.**

## Policing Priorities in the area

### Priority

Speeding in rural villages has been highlighted from a resident poll

## Action Taken:

Sleaford Neighbourhood Policing Team have been carrying out several speed checks in the local rural villages. We recently engaged in Project EDWARD (Every Day Without A Road Death) which saw several officers deployed across Lincolnshire's roads enforcing Fatal Four offences throughout the week of action. We continue to be in areas most affected and encourage the community to take part in Community Speed Watch.

PCSOs have the power to stop a mechanically propelled vehicle on a road and issue traffic offence reports under section 89 Road traffic regulations Act 1984.

Speeding in rural villages has been highlighted from a resident poll on the Nextdoor App and speeding was the main concern. PCSOS will be out at various times and days of the week carrying out speed checks and dealing with any offences.

Police must be overt when carrying out the checks and wear high visibility uniform.

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## WILL THE BILLINGHAY BOYS PLEASE STAY BEHIND

Mick Wright or "Wrighty" as he was known was a well known character in Billinghay and served as a hard working Councillor for Billinghay Parish Council.

Over a period of many years, Mick gave a lot of time to research the lives of Billinghay people who served in both World Wars It was a project that was very dear to him and provides an insight of interest to many local families. During this time he made trips to the battlefields to visit as many graves of the fallen as he could.

He had hoped to put his research into a book for publication but never felt it was fully complete. Unfortunately, Mick passed away before his work came to fruition. He did, however, pass copies of his research to the Parish Council and it is split into two volumes:

- A volume detailing the involvement of Billinghay people during the conflicts
- A volume giving details of individuals and the role they played

We felt that the years of hard work that had gone into production of this research were worthy of publication and we commenced this process in the January/February 2021 issue of the Newsletter . Specific individual details can be given to relations who may request them via the Parish Office. The next chapter is detailed below:

## <u>1918 Part Two</u>

I do not really want to single out **Joseph E Bailey**, Private 225651, Lancashire Fusiliers, who died on 20<sup>th</sup> April 1918, aged 36 years, as being any braver than any others in this book, but to my mind he was a true hero. Joseph Ely Bailey was born on 3<sup>rd</sup> June 1881 at North Kyme, the son of Mark Bailey (1849-1924) and Jane (nee Bralsford, 1852-1961) who were married on 21<sup>st</sup> July at Lincoln Register Office. Mark was a farmer at North Kyme Fen, later Billinghay. Joseph first joined the Notts and Derby Regiment (Regimental number 49697) and, according to the family, was discharged from that service because he had developed varicose veins. He could then have sat out the war in safety, but on returning home he was so determined to return to the front that he had the varicose veins treated, became eligible for re-enlistment, and then joined the Lancashire Fusiliers, eventually returning to the front.

On 21<sup>st</sup> March 1918 the Germans commenced their final offensive on the Somme. At first this was successful, and Ludendorff was keen to launch a second offensive in the north. This commenced on 8<sup>th</sup> April towards Houzebrouck south of Ypres. It met with only light resistance from poorly trained and motivated Portuguese troops. On 12<sup>th</sup> April Field Marshall Haig issued the order "With our backs to the wall and believing in the justice of our cause each one of us must fight to the end." The attack was finally halted on 29<sup>th</sup> April. Joseph was killed during this period. He has no known grave and is commemorated on the Tyne Cot Memorial.

**Wyles Harvey**, Private 202109, 1<sup>st</sup>/4<sup>th</sup> Battalion, the Lincolnshire Regiment died May 7<sup>th</sup>, 1918, aged 24 years. Wiles was the son of James and Harriet Harvey of High Street, Billinghay and brother of John. He was born on 20<sup>th</sup> August 1893 and baptised on 10<sup>th</sup> September 1893 at Billinghay. He is buried in Lodge Hill Cemetery, Birmingham. The Commonwealth War Graves Commission records his name as Wyles, but on the Billinghay War Memorial it is spelt Wiles, which I believe is the correct spelling. In "The History of the Lincolnshire Regiment" I can find no casualty record of Wiles Harvey. It is possible that he died of wounds or of an illness.

**Harry Spencer**, Serjeant 36362, 1<sup>st</sup>/5<sup>th</sup> Battalion Leicestershire Regiment died on Wednesday 10<sup>th</sup> July 1918 aged 24 years. Henry Chamberlain told me that Harry Spencer was married and had a son, Mack Spencer and a daughter Greta. Harry's widow married Harold Stokes and later had a son Ken Stokes. Greta married Don Walker. The 1901 Census records appear to show that Harry was the son of Herbert Spencer and Lizzie (nee Pearson) who married in the December quarter of 1888 in the Sleaford District. He had 2 sisters, Bertha aged 10 and Edna aged 8. Mrs Spencer of High Street Billinghay confirmed the above information. Harry Spencer was her uncle as was Joseph Wattam (Leicesters).

**Arthur Sumpter**, Private 82018, 15<sup>th</sup> Battalion Machine Gun Corps Infantry) died on 31<sup>st</sup> July 1918 aged 25 years. Arthur Sumpter was born at North Kyme and was the son of David and Arabella Sumpter of West Street, Billinghay. No further details are known at this time. Arthur is buried in Denain Communal Cemetery. Denain was a German hospital during the greater part of the war. The Communal Cemetery was used by the Germans to bury their soldiers and, in 1917 and 1918, 153 British prisoners. From the date of Arthur's death, it is thought that he was a prisoner at that time.

**Edward Kettles**, Private 47646, 5<sup>th</sup> Battalion the Rifle Brigade, died on 28<sup>th</sup> August 1918. I have been unable to find any definite information locally but believe that Edward was born at Burton on Stather near Scunthorpe in 1899. The Register of Honour in the village Church lists Edward as serving in a regiment other than the Lincolnshires, so I believe that the Commonwealth War Graves entry could be the correct one. Furthermore, there is an E Kettles recorded on the North Kyme War Memorial as serving in the Rifle Brigade. Edward has no known grave and is commemorated on the Vis-en-Artois Memorial, Pas de Calais, France.



**Fred Scott**, Lance Corporal 38692, 7<sup>th</sup> Battalion Lincolnshire Regiment, died on Thursday 19<sup>th</sup> September 1918. Fred was born on 17<sup>th</sup> October 1884 and baptised 10<sup>th</sup> November 1884 at Billinghay. He was the son of Lynn Scott, labourer, and later publican of the Mill Inn (1852-1912) and Lydia (nee Tindal 1847-1910). Fred married Minnie (nee Creasey) born 1886/1887 on 24<sup>th</sup> November 1908 at Billinghay. He worked as a carter and was the father of Len Scott, Haulier (1916-1980) and grandfather of Dennis Scott, Haulier of the

#### Cross Roads, Billinghay Fen.

The 7th Battalion took part in the Battle of Epehy, which started on 18<sup>th</sup> September 1918, and which was an attack by the 4<sup>th</sup> Army under Rawlinson and the 3<sup>rd</sup> Army under Byng on a front of 17 miles from Holnon to Gouzeaucourt. The 1<sup>st</sup>, 2<sup>nd</sup> and 7<sup>th</sup> Lincolns took part. The 7<sup>th</sup> Lincolns stayed in huts on the Lachelle – Ypres road until 9.30.pm, then moved to assembly positions on Fins Ridge. This movement was completed at 1a.m. on 18<sup>th</sup>. At 5.24 they moved forward but were not in the first attack. They advanced in heavy rain at 6.29 a.m. and reached all their objectives, penetrating the enemy lines to a depth of 3 miles. The gains were consolidated, and no further moves were made on 19<sup>th</sup>. The casualties in the action were one officer and 21 other ranks killed and one officer and 239 other ranks wounded and 29 other ranks missing. Fred was one of the missing. He has no known grave and is commemorated on the Vis-en-Artois Memorial, Pas de Calais, France.

**Nellie Willson**, Staff Nurse Queen Alexandra's Imperial Service, died on Wednesday, 16<sup>th</sup> October 1918 aged 30 Years. Nellie was the daughter of Arthur Willson, a farm Labourer (b1865?) and Susan (b1863?) of 5 Queen Street. Billinghay. In the 1901 census they are described as living in Lucy Street which may have been a previous name for Queen Street. (Death Certificate) She was buried in Billinghay Old Cemetery.

My Next move was to visit the old cemetery to examine the gravestone and also those of **Sydney Atchinson and John Hildred** (see below). I was disappointed to find that no trace of them remained. I then wrote to the CWGC to ask why the graves were not commemorated. Their reply shocked me. Sometime in the late fifties and early sixties the Parish Council decided to remove all gravestones in the old cemetery, including one war grave, for I found out that only John Hildred was officially commemorated, and Nellie Willson and Sydney Atchinson had private memorials. I am told that the memorials were broken up and used as hardcore in a local farmyard. They also told me that the state of Billinghay's new cemetery was, at that time, so bad that the CWGC would not allow any memorial to be placed there. So, a new non-standard memorial had been made commemorating all three and this was placed in Coningsby cemetery. The stone was inscribed as follows: -

### 1914-1918 THIS SOLDIER AND THIS STAFF NURSE DIED IN THE SERVICE OF THEIR COUNTRY

#### CPL. J HILDRED RASC 27.12.18 STAFF NURSE N WILLSON 16.10.18 ALSO SAPPER G ATCHINSON ROYAL ENGINEERS 27.5.20

#### AND LIE BURIED IN ST MICHAEL'S CHURCHYARD CEMETERY BILLINGHAY

I am pleased to say that the present Council agreed to meet all expenses in moving the stone back to Billinghay, adding names to the Memorial and also paying for its upkeep.

## Income in retirement

In the last article I looked at the different types of pension available. Following on from this I wanted to look at how much you actually need to save to support yourself in retirement.

To do this we need to make a few assumptions, so please do take these into account. I am assuming that you have worked at least 35 years and accumulated a full State Pension. I am also assuming that at retirement age 67, you are fit and healthy with no underlying health conditions and a non-smoker. If either of these are not correct, then the figures I am providing need adjusting. Finally, I am assuming a salary of £15,000 after tax and you do not want to take any risk once you stop work (other types of income are available in retirement but do carry some risk).

At age 67 a full State Pension will bring in an income of  $\pounds$ 9,400 approximately a year. If you are used to a salary of  $\pounds$ 15,000 after tax then without any savings or pensions you will have shortfall of  $\pounds$ 5,600 a year. This will be quite an adjustment to your lifestyle if you are not prepared.

To 'buy' this income, in this low interest rate environment, you will need a fund of approximately £105,000 to generate a guaranteed income for life of £5,600. This will pay out a fixed amount, with no increases for inflation for your life only. When you die the income will die with you. If you are married, then your spouse will lose this source of income. If you include a spouse's pension then the fund required will increase. Hopefully during your working life, you experienced some increases in your wages. We all certainly know how much prices are rising at the moment. From 67 to normal life expectancy inflation can have a significant impact. The figures quoted above will effectively mean that the spending power of your money will fall every year in retirement.

If you want to protect yourself against inflation then you would need a fund of £190,000 to ensure the pension income keeps pace with inflation in retirement. I hope that some of you have already started to save towards your retirement, either through a Workplace pension or through a personal arrangement. Some of you may even be lucky enough to have an old Company Pension Scheme where the pension is based on final salary. If you haven't then do not panic. It is never too late to start and even a small amount can accumulate over time. And it doesn't have to be in a pension

## BILLINGHAY LIGHT CAR AND MOTORCYCLE CLUB

THE CLUB WAS FORMED IN 1957 AND MEETINGS WERE HELD IN THE GOLDEN CROSS COURTESY OF MR SID PEARCE, THE LANDLORD AT THE TIME.

BRIAN OLIVE WAS THE CHAIRMAN AND FOUNDER OF THE CLUB. HIS FATHER OWNED THE FISH SHOP ON THE HIGH STREET. THE OLDER PEOPLE IN THE VILLAGE WILL REMEMBER BRIAN'S UNCLE TEDDY WHO HAD TWO BLUE BUSES THAT COVERED SLEAFORD AND THE SURROUNDING AREA. ## BILLINGHAY CHURCH OF ENGLAND PRIMARY SCHOOL

Welcome! We are now well into Term 3 and nearly half way through another academic year at school. This has been one of the most challenging terms that we have encountered, with many pupils and staff absent with Covid, but we can face term 4 after Easter with fresh optimism.

During a busy half term since Christmas and upcoming events:

- All classes carried out work focusing on e Safety (to coincide with the national Safer Internet Day on the 8<sup>th</sup> February).
- Our School Council have previously looked at ways as to how the school can help to reduce the amount of plastic that is used in our lives and how we can help to save the oceans. They focused on single use plastics and reduced the use of single use plastics in school. We are now signed up with the Persil Dirt is Good Schools Programme to take action on environmental and social causes. We are encouraging our pupils to be courageous advocates, to be able to speak out against an injustice and become agents for change. Our children are discussing causes that they are passionate about (locally and globally) and we will take these forward, giving them knowledge, values and confidence to be change makers for life.
- School has successfully applied for Department for Education funding to access training and support to help with Children's Mental Health and Wellbeing. In addition to promoting positive mental health and wellbeing, we aim to recognise and respond to need as it arises.
- Research shows that a lot of values about careers are entrenched at 7 years old. School starts from Reception to challenge these entrenched views so children do not just decide to 'go with what they know' from an early age. Our careers education programme is designed to raise aspirations, broaden horizons and give choices, challenge stereotypes and ultimately to give pupils opportunities and the right mindset to prepare them for the future.

Alongside numerous opportunities/visitors linked to careers, we also hold an annual careers week in school. Pupils have the opportunity to access visits/ listen to visitors either in person or online talking about their careers. Our next careers week is during the week beginning 14<sup>th</sup> March. Pupils will be visiting RAF Coningsby, have a talk from RAF personnel in school, have STEM ambassadors in school talking about careers in science and technology, have magistrates in the community in school and one of our ex pupils, Courtney Luther talking about setting up her baking business.

- Our Easter Service will be at St Michael's Church on the 31<sup>st</sup> March at 10am. I would also like to take this opportunity to thank Rev Holt and our Bishop's Visitor, Mel Cuttell for their help and support and we look forward to the events organised by them taking place in school next term:
  - Mustard Seed Group working with Chickadee Class on a Friday afternoon in Term 4.
  - A half day of activities in school linked to Holy Week with all the pupils involved, reflecting on the events leading up to and concluding with Easter Monday.
  - Organising a new prayer tree and helping us to further develop the importance of prayer.
  - Leading acts of worship.

We look forward to continued success in the remainder of the spring term and the lead up to Easter.
