We are discussing the revised location for the 30mph sign along Mill Lane and when this is agreed and in place, we will arrange for a location where one of the SIDs can be used. As mentioned, people have been rotating the devices without permission and we would reiterate that if identified, they will be reported to the Police.

Highways

We would again like to remind residents that it helps if they report problems via Fix My Street. Even if they are adding to a problem already on the system, the volume of reorts may affect priorities.

At a meeting with our County Councillor and a Highways Officer with a local resident in attendance, footpath problems were fully discussed. Highways agreed to carry out a full footpath survey in the village and carry out remedial work if necessary.

Defibrillators

As mentioned in the last issue, we had received permission to place another defibrillator on the external wall of the Fire Station. After obtaining estimates for the cost of fitting, we are delighted to advise that the necessary work has been done to make a power supply available. Work to bring the unit into use will be completed shortly.

Parish Clerk

The selection process for a new Parish Clerk has commenced and interviews for the position will be carried out in the near future.

External Audit

We are pleased to announce that the external audit has been completed. The external auditors have confirmed that our finances are in order and the official notice has been posted on the Parish Notice Boards. If you wish to inspect the parish finances, please follow the instructions in the External Auditor's Certificate.

Village Sign

We have received confirmation from LCC Highways that the missing village sign on Walcott Road will be replaced in the near future. In addition they have agreed to replace the planter that went missing at the same time. This will be sorted when the sign is in place as it will be positioned between the village sign poles.

Litter Picking

We have had no takers for the free litter picking kits since the last issue. However we are delighted to report that the group who we have passed some kits on to have been making good use of them. Below is a picture of the five bags they collected when using the field footpaths.



Whilst we would ask people using these paths to take their rubbish home or use the bins in place round the village, we are extremely grateful to the "Wombles" team for their efforts to keep Billinghay tidy.


Junior Football

SPEED INDICATOR DEVICES



The Parish Council now has two Speed Indicating Devices (SIDs) in use, with one situated at the Walcott end of the village, near to the junction of Field Road, and one on Walcott Road near to the junction of Shire Close.

With two sets of data now available from both locations, we can start to use the data to look at trends. Unfortunately, both devices have been tampered with over the last month and the data obtained has been compromised. These means we will have to gain more reliable data over the coming months to accurately trend the data.

Unsurprisingly, the data does show an increase in vehicles through the village over the period where the B1191 between Kirkstead Bridge and Woodhall Spa has been closed.

From 8th August 2023 to 25th September 2023, the device located up from the Field Road junction faced traffic leaving the village to Walcott. The data recorded is in both directions. The basic statistics for the period are as follows:

Average speed:	28.70 mph	28.69 mph
Number of vehicles over period:	99658	95550
Percentage of vehicles doing 30 mph or less:	73%	74%

This showed a significant improvement on the speed of vehicles at this location leaving the village from the period 13th May 2023 to 7th August 2023.

From 11th August 2023 to 25th September 2023, the device located by Shire Close junction faced traffic heading to Walcott. The data recorded is in both directions. The basic statistics for the period are as follows:

Percentage of vehicles doing 30 mph or less:	88%	92%

This showed a significant improvement on the speed of vehicles in both directions from the period 27th March 2023 to 12th May 2023 at this location. However, the tampering of this device has affected this data.

As before, the maximum speed recorded has not been published as we do not want to encourage anyone to think this is a target to be beaten.

If the Council identify anyone tampering with the device, they will be reported to the Police





FIX MY STREET



Fed up with problems such as potholes, broken paving slabs, street lighting and overgrown hedges?

If everyone who is affected also reported the problem direct to Lincolnshire County Council, the seriousness of the problem would be emphasised. The identity of the person reporting the problem can remain anonymous unless they choose to show their name.

Residents without computer access can still report problems via the Parish Council who will pass on details to Lincolnshire County Council. We will continue to do this but we can only register the complaint once. Numerous residents reporting the same problem will have a greater impact on prioritising problems.

Therefore, we would recommend that you use the system provided by the County Council and report the problems directly to them using the **Fix My Street system on the LCC website**.

A WALK THROUGH THE PAST IN BILLINGHAY (Continued from the last issue)

At the end of Victoria Street, there are the ruins of South's Mill, which was demolished in the 1950s. The sails and capping have gone, and the mill is crumbling into decay with weeds growing on its brickwork and birds roosting in its hollow spaces. Originally it was a fine sight and, in a good wind its four sails turned all night to grind the grain. In November 1936 it was the scene of a particularly gruesome tragedy when a man called Faulkner was working alone in the mill, fastening sacks to a continuous chain with a second chain which was a little like a dog's choke collar, tightening around the sack's neck and carrying it up through the floors of the mill. Somehow Faulkner's wrist was trapped and, struggling fruitlessly to free himself, he was caught up in the endless chain and pulled through four storeys into the cogs at the top of the mill. He left a wife and three children, the eldest being only seven years old.

Retracing your steps, a little at this point, return down Victoria Street to its corner with King Street. On the corner of King Street there are the remains of a finely decorated doorway, now bricked in. This was the site of Bunkum Billy Hall's grocery, with his well -remembered slogan of "no stamps, no dividends, no bunkum" to encourage his customers to "pay on the nail".

Passing several substantially built Victorian houses, you will pass the area where Abraham Merilion had a bicycle shop and shoe repairers. He was joined by Bam Hunt, another colourful character, who claimed he could "charm" the most savage dog, although it was suspected that his charms lay more in the malodourous horse's heel he had about him than in his hypnotic personality.

Another character, Mr Cooling, was supposed to be able to charm warts away. People had to count their warts accurately and say to him "Please Mr Cooling, will you have my (Number) warts?" It even worked long distance. A girl at Sleaford High School had hands, arms and Legs covered in warts. She counted them with the help of her family and wrote the same message on a slip of paper and signed her name. Almost two to three weeks later every one had disappeared. Coincidence or magic?

15 King Street was a stable and granary at one time being part of the hay and straw business of the same Mr Merilion who owned the bicycle shop in King Street. It was later turned into a private house for his son David, his wife and family at the beginning of World War Two.

21 King Street was a stable and granary and later it too was converted to a private house.

27 King Street was known as Hickling's Corner long after the last member of the family left. It was a grocery and bakery business, and the sights and smells of the old flash oven were a magnet to the local Children. Edward Hickling's business was already in existence when he came to the village in the late 1870s and did not close completely until the 1950s. It produced a whole range of bakery items to be delivered from house to house by a hand cart or a carrier bike.

Mr Hickling's eldest and youngest took over the bakery business in turn and the second eldest son took over the grocery business. The first change took place on the death of Mr Hickling's unmarried daughter in 1920. When anyone in the village killed a pig some of the minced pork was used to fill pork pie pastry cases which were raised around 2lb jam jars. The real experts raised the pastry upwards around a wooden mould, and it would stay upright and straight if properly made. These would then be sent along to bakers like Hickling's who would then bake them in their ovens for a small fee.

Facing Hickling's corner, 56 High Street, was the site where, on 9th September 1864, one of the worst fires in Lincolnshire began, engulfing much of the surrounding area. Its ferocity and extent resulted from a combination of circumstances. There had been two dry summers and that day there was a strong westerly wind to fan the flames, which had the perfect fuel in the mud and stud houses and the thatch of their roofs. The fire began about 10.30 am when most of the villagers were out in the fields, and although the flames were soon spotted by them, they had a good hold. The fire engine was not of immediate use because of the distance between fire and the water supply, although eventually the Billinghay engine, along with the engine from Tattershall and the help of every able-bodied man woman and child in the village prevented even further devastation.

The fire is generally believed to have started in a blocked chimney and sparked the roof of an outbuilding alight. The fire then raced through an oat stack, two haystacks, a pigsty and other buildings in the yard before roasting across an apple orchard and leaping from house to house and street to street. All in all, the fire made its way along High Street, into Victoria Street, West Street and King Street, destroying a large part of the village, including the Methodist Chapel in Victoria Street. That evening, after the fire was doused and as thatch and straw still smouldered, over one hundred people huddled miserably in the village school room grieving over their lost homes and possessions, though luckily the only fatalities were pigs, trapped and roasted in their sties. The High Street Primitive Methodist Chapel was built in 1840 and is the third of the village chapels. It was a much simpler than its rival Methodist Chapel in Victoria Street, being both smaller and less ostentatiously decorated. It was noted for a "miraculous conversion." Like the Victoria Street Methodist Church, it was also a focus for Temperance. Around the turn of the century the notorious Billinghay Roughs took it into their heads to attend one of these to create their usual mayhem. The Movement then scored one of its greatest successes for the Roughs took the Pledge instead and Nickel Bavin became a great feature of the high summer Temperance Day Parades, with his massive bulk clothed convincingly as John Bull.

Searching in a timetable directory

When you have clicked on a children's centre, to quickly find the same word on the page press Ctrl F and enter the word into the search bar. It will then be highlighted on the page.

The Saturday timetable is the same for all children centres. Families may decide to visit another location at weekends, so all sessions are shown without needing to search.

How to print

To print a timetable, use your browser. Please be aware that printed timetables can soon become out of date as the directory may be updated at any time.

Look in the top right corner of your screen:

- for Microsoft Edge users select
 - for Google Chrome users select

You should then see the option to Print.

How to translate

Scroll to the bottom of any page and select 'Translation'. You will then go to a page where you can select the language. Once you have chosen the language you will be on the county council home page. Do not use the search bar as that will cancel the translation. To see the directories, scroll down and select 'Childcare and family support', then the second yellow button, 'find a children's centre'.

Everything will be in the chosen language as you navigate until you cancel or use the search.


